

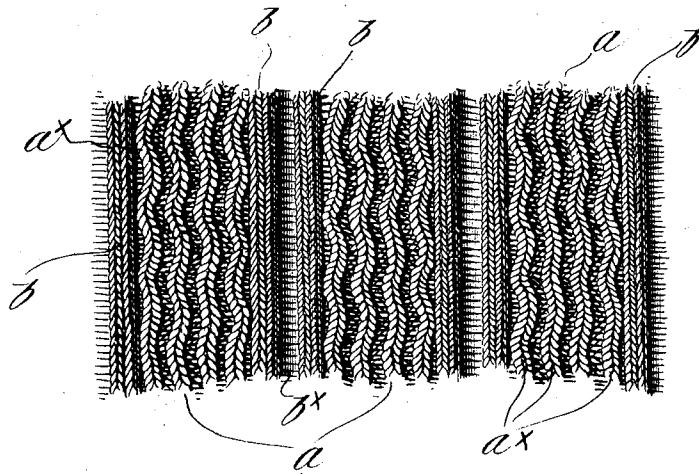

DESIGN FOR FABRIC.

SPECIFICATION forming part of Design No. 36,210, dated January 27, 1903.

Application filed December 24, 1902. Serial No. 136,502. Term of patent 7 years.

To all whom it may concern:

Be it known that I, WALTER A. O'BRIEN, a citizen of the United States, and a resident of Boston, county of Suffolk, State of Massachusetts, have invented a new, original, and ornamental Design for a Fabric, of which the following is a full, clear, and exact description, reference being had to the accompanying drawing, forming part hereof.

10 The drawing represents a face view of a portion of a fabric illustrating my design.

The leading feature of my design consists in a series of broad bands each ornamented by a plurality of relatively small sinuous or

15 serpentine ribs in parallelism, the longitudinal edges of the bands being defined and accented by relatively large rope-like wales contacting at intervals with the outer ribs of each set, the wales of two adjacent bands being laterally separated by a longitudinal trough-like

20 depression.

In the drawing the broad bands *a* have each a plurality of ornamental sinuous or serpentine ribs *a*^x thereon, the longitudinal edges of the bands being defined and accented by relatively large rope-like wales *b*, which contact at intervals with the contiguous ribs, and the wales of two adjacent bands are separated by a longitudinal trough-like depression *b*^x.

I claim—

The ornamental design for a fabric, substantially as herein shown and described.
