I use a DYMO Tapewriter to number the top of each heddle bar at the right corner....masking tape with a marker pen notation, as someone

mentioned, would also work well. The tape comes in various colors if that would be helpful and the tape sticks to the heddle bar. While sitting centered in front of the loom, I can 'eye' the action of the harnesses very easily.

The replaced ties. I marked ever other shaft 1, black, 3 green, 5 red and 7 blue. I found that green and blue faded to similar colours over the years, so I separated them well. I used a Sharpie permanent marker with big flat tip and just ran it along the eye area. I did not turn over, just one side is enough. It takes a lot of marker to do all the heddles. I also marked the top of the centre heddle on each shaft and every 20th one on each side. I put 3x as many on shafts 1 and 2 and 2 times as many on shaft 3 and 4 because I do tied weaves a lot.

I also mark the shaft number on top and bottom bar, front and back.

AAF wrote: "One needs to be very careful about the use of the word "...inhuman..." for it all too frequently suggests a lack of first hand experience with real production technology in a real production venue." Thanks for your correction. I must acknowledge that we are currently in our "post industrial state" as a result of achievements made in the production environment and we continue to depend on production weaving for many things that can be done best in that environment. "It is this lack of direct experience with mill technology that I have always maintained causes so many handloom weavers to actually assume that textile technology is capable of doing more than it can do and attributing to it a certain sense of "magic" which it does not possess." This point makes sense to me and may be a cause of some nervousness about technology. When I wonder if some painstaking effort to throw a shuttle by hand has been worth while, I ask myself if a production machine somewhere could have (or would have) done the job more efficiently. It is difficult to answer such a question without knowing the industry well.

I marked my heddles yesterday, Lois. It took me about an hour & a half to build all 16 shafts & mark 1600 heddles. I'm sure dyeing would take longer. As I put each shaft together (admittedly not a very complex task on an AVL), I laid it on a table (newspaper covering the table) and spread the heddles only enough so that I could mark each heddle. I marked both above & below the eye and on both sides of each shaft. I left one shaft in each sequence white, and used red, green & blue for the other 3 colors. I used Sharpie permanent markers for the task.

The loom is unpacked and put together, the Cyrefco CompuMarche is uncrated and bolted on, cords tied, treadles hooked up. I turn on the loom, turn on the power, cross my fingers....nothing. Ugh. I double check my tie-ups, no cords appear to be crossed, the shafts all look to be free and not hung up on each other or anything else. The lower lamms were free, at least before I snitched up the dobby drawcords. Now there is just a little play. I think the tension is ok for the dobby drawcords. Yes, I remembered to remove the locking pin from the center pully.

Now is the tricky bit. Figuring out what was wrong. Everything worked fine before the move.

Right now, it appears that the lower dobby arm isn't moving the full range of motion (the arm that is controlling the hooks) Now it could be that the upper arm is the problem, since both work together, but that isn't where I'm noting the resistance. I video taped

my disassembly, and I can clearly see in the video the full range of motion for the dobby arm. Normally, you could manually turn the central pully and make the arms move. I can't do that right now. It seems like the problem is related to tension, but I can't figure out where. There is also the possibility that something in the move put the loom out of whack, but I'm not seeing anything obviously wrong either.

Any suggestions? Hints? Ideas? I tried calling Jeff Wilson, but he hasn't been home.

Mine are typically 40"-50" wide and anywhere from 30-50 yards long. I usually weave them as fabric so there are no obvious dividing lines to split the

length. The shorter ones are no problem, I just wash them and hang them over my second floor railing to dry.

I don't recall seeing any discussion on this so if there has been, please let me know which digest it was in.

When I first demonstrated with the Magic Dobby, it was pegged bars at that time, people were extremely interested and wanted to buy what came off the loom with no problem. Men and children were fair facinated by it all.

The next time I demo'd I had the computer hooked up and if anything there was more interest. It seemed that the more "advanced" the technique the more people are intrigued by it.

This ties in to the recent discussions about demo'ing in old time clothes, making it seem that weaving is really a thing of the past. With the computer, people make the connection to what is modern and futuristic. I have a write-up on the original Jacquard loom, the 'punch card' bars that program the loom, etc. I find people are really interested in all this.

Then I dry on my line which is circular (one of those pole things that rotate) and lay the yardage over the lines in a draping manner, using clothespins just on the selvedges. For white woolens (I don't dry those in the sun because the sun will yellow white wool) I have a long (16t.) metal pole on uprights that is in the shade. In the winter, I can drape yardage on several plastic coated poles (covered with the plastic covers for shower poles) in the shower using additional poles running the lenath of the tub. That is in my studio so I don't take up space in usable showers in the house. Anyway, that is what I do and am open for better suggestions. Cheers, Kathleen hndwvnds@ccrtc.com

Ruth, I have used an apron on the first warp I put on and if the visual clues are correct, Paul used an apron when he warped this loom. It isn'r really attached, just has a warp stick in the apron and that is slipped into the groove on the back beam. ONce you wrap it around the beam once you dont need any thing else. You can omit the apron and then attach when you reach the end of the warp to get every last inch from the warp. Peggy Osterkamp describes it in her book. the advantage of not using the paron is a very smooth warp on that back beam. I rarely use it on the Home Loom I have

Yes, I have an apron and am using it. Very easy system. I used the sandpaper beam to tensin the warp and then wove in a few lease sticks. Then continued with weaving normally for a foot or so. Brought the apron up to the front beam and lashed it on. Worked very well for me.

If you're looking for advantage of not doing it, I don't think Bonnie Inouye uses an apron, at least not on her cloth storage system.

If you do go the apron route on the cloth storage system, one tip: as the bar at the end of the apron advances under the loom and near the treadle cables, keep an eye on it. Mine got caught a few times early on and significantly wore the coating on the outside of the cable. Eventually one broke, and then the 2nd. Not a big deal to replace, but inconvenient sometimes depending on timing. Now I just keep an eye on it for a couple of advances or so at that point.

We have WeaveMaker Pro here at SU and, like so many of the weave design softwares targeted to the handloom weaving trade, it has a most serious fault. It will not allow a weave design to be initiated from a blank grid. One can perform all sorts of manipulations of the weave draft once that quadrant has been completed but no initial design of the weave structure can be done in it.

This common software fault stems from the most handloom weavers using the entering, shed sequence (treadling) and sheds (tie-up) to communicate designs whereas the weave draft (drawdown) is used when, if and as there is felt a need to see what the fabric will look like. Unfortunately, this is not the function of the weave draft. Rather than being a two-dimensional graphic representation of the fabric, the weave draft is a three dimensional diagram of the fabric structure. Although the third dimension is quite small , fabric is in fact a three dimensional construct and needs to be understood in that way if one is to function properly as a woven fabric designer.

I started using the flanges with my Home Loom and could not weave without them, in my opinion excellent gadget. =If the warp is narrow I just use the sand beam paper to hold it, if not I=use an apron, wind on the sand beam paper, use two lease sticks and when =Ι have woven one and a half around the beam I unwind, cut off from the apron and rewind. If the warp is long I will use the cloth storage beam once I=have woven about two yards. Just unwind, extend to the storage beam, usi =ng wide marking tape at intervals to secure to the beam. I have a friend who has both WeaveMaker One and WeaveMaker Pro. I asked her to help with a possible solution to your question and ALLEN FANNIN's scenario. The following is her reply:

First of all, I own both WeaveMaker One and WeaveMaker Pro so I have tested both of them for analysis. On page 127 of the manual, it describes how to do an analysis in WeaveMaker One. The catch is that a threading must be put in first, but this can be done with a simple click of the cornucopia tool and a random threading will appear. If a straight or point draw is desired, that could be chosen as well. In most commercial applications, the straight draw is preferred.

Then, click on the pencil tool and start entering the design in the "drawdown" area which is blank to start with. That's all there is to it. The pegplan will automatically analyze the pattern and reflect the necessary lifts in the pegplan.

The second assumption that there is no way to see a cross section of the weave pattern is incorrect as there is a constant reflection of the "up and down" threads right beside and above the warp and weft threads so that long skips can be avoided. In addition there is a "float" diagram that can be accessed to give a three dimensional effect if desired.

Although I hate to do it, it sometimes pays off to read the manual! There is a Special Menu that deals with Heddles/Harness, Float Histogram, Split Harness, Show Fabric in 3-D and Fabric Display. Also did you know that WeaveMaker's block substitution is cleverly done by using an algebraic expression? So easy!

Any more questions? It is good to review some of the features that I use infrequently as I am more intrigued with generating patterns than copying or analyzing other's patterns. I also think that there is nothing like trying the pattern with real yarn and setts to see what it really will look like.

I use and value my 2 year old copy of WeaveMaker One. I love the promised functionality of WeaveMaker and am only disappointed in its current lack of quality.

And this is the primary fault with this and other softwares. They do not allow a design to be initiated from the weave draft which is the controlling segment of the total draft. One does not know the entering nor any of the other information until the weave has been established. This software problem is a reflection of how handloom weavers generally do not fully understand the weave draft as a 3D structural diagram of the fabric as opposed to a 2D graphic image of the pattern. There are many fabric designs which I and others have done where there is a clearly discernable 2D graphic image on the woven goods, but which image is not apparent in the weave draft. On the other hand, there are probably as many designs whose weave draft shows a 2D graphic image of sorts but whose finished fabric is nothing more than a complex triple plain weave.

>I'd like to ask how any of you deal with washing and drying long warps. Mine >are typically 40"-50" wide and anywhere from 30-50 yards long. I usually >weave them as fabric so there are no obvious dividing lines to split the >length. The shorter ones are no problem, I just wash them and hang them over >my second floor railing to dry.

The occasional long warps I weave are dumped in the bathtub for washing and rinsing. (My feet get very clean.) I spin the water out in the washing machine if the fabric will fit. For the last rinse, which I never put in the washing machine, I let the piece just drain. I fold the fabric to fit the bathtub and walk on it with towels both below the fabric and on top to absorb as much water as possible. I then hang the fabric over the shower rod until the outer layer is dryish. Refold several times until the whole piece is dryish.

I press while the fabric is still damp. A good spot to press wide warps is a bed with a clean sheet. If you need to hard press the fabric, use a table top padded with a towel.

In the first instance, I am looking at a floral stitched double plain weave fabric for which the actual weave draft does not show anything resembling flowers.

In the second instance there is a stitched double plain fabric draft also in front of me which has a ragged diagonal "pattern" to the weave draft on paper but which has a vertical stripe colour pattern in the actual goods because of the warp and filling arrangements.

The point being that the "pattern" which one perceives to the weave draft may or may not coincide with the actual fabric image because the weave draft is a 3D structural diagram of warp and filling risers and sinkers. This concept is one of the most difficult to communicate to handloom weavers whose training has focused primarily on the entering and the 2D graphic image of the goods.

The yarn is 55/45 hemp/cotton, and is 8/4, 1680 ypp. I made some lovely carpet warp towels at Christmas time - they were a stripe of white, small stripe of color, repeating all the way across and ending with white. They were in a simple plain twill. I'd like to make a large quantity of these again, out of the hemp cotton yarn. They were indestructible out of carpet warp, and almost like pillow ticking in their strength. They were also nice looking and a one shuttle weave. Of course, to do a large quantity, I'd like to use the doup heddles on the 10' loom. There is incredible stress on the thread on harness 2, where the doup heddle hangs. I will weight the doup heddle thread and the thread on harness 2 seperately this time saving myself much breakage. The article did say to do this, but I was dealing with an already threaded loom. I want to thread the doups on harness one and two, and then the 4 harness twill pattern on 3 - 6, treadling 1,3,4 then 2,4,5 then 1,5,6 then 2,6,3 to get my pattern. I've only seen the doups done with plain weave, but was hoping I could thread them on seperate harnesses from the pattern and get the results I want. I did not get good results when I treadled this on the loom now - but I have the loom threaded in a straight twill (1,2,3,4,5,6). Any ideas anyone? Also I was not able to find many sources for hemp cotton. The only one I was able to find was the one for 8/4 but I had really wanted something thinner. I have a large cone that I got in a trade made by Kraemer Textiles, 12/2 in a cotton count that is 50/50. Not able to scare up any more information on them, though.

Anyone else working with hemp cotton? Or just plain hemp?

I think that Virtual Hand Weaving can do something like that, however, the web site seems to be undergoing redesign right now. This is software produced by a guy in France. He is comming from a commercial weaving background and has a version of his software for mill use in addition to that he is offering for hand weavers. He was active on the weaving list about a year ago, till he was drummed off the list for asking too many questions and letting ppl know when he was releasing new (bug fix) versions.

I would recommend that you sample with the hemp/cotton before putting on a long warp. I Have hemp/cotton from a Canadian source and it is only suitable as weft. I heard that a student at Summer School used hemp/cotton from the same source for her warp and it broke continuously. (granted she was a new weaver)

It is attached using masking tape... then the beam is rolled and placed on the tension spring. As it is not necessary to unroll the apron completely to reach the breast beam, the masking tape has stayed in place for 4 years. The apron usually has one or two layers of the beam at all times. The rod for tying on just slips through the loops in the apron. (This is the part you need to align carefully) Off to one side or the other and you will have the rod hit the cloth advance, the cam for the dobby or the brake for the beater. Once you use the apron for the first time you won't go back. Note to SETT 99 friends... I did get inspired again... I actually made my first garment without a pattern, I made the lining for a commercial denim jacket and, embellished it. Not the stuff of fashion shows, But enough sucess to tell me to try it again.

Thanks for giving me the encouragement to design for myself and not just to use patterns. Maybe someday I will be ready to enter something in the fashion shows.

My apron is long enough to go to the cloth storage roller. Once the web reaches the storage roller (about 65" or so) I cut it from the apron, and masking tape to a plain roller. (DH made me several extras for this). The cloth storage roller can hold up to about 60 yards max, although 40 is more manageable, and I then cut the fabric, move the filled roller to an inspection/repair table, tape the fabric to another storage roller and can continue to weave while a helper (or me at another time - darn, I wish I could get the cloning procedure to work!) inspects and repairs.

I didn't like rolling the web onto the sandpaper beam although I know some people do like this option.

Well, well! I have finally been bitten by the new loom bug. After doing a fair amount of research into the different makes of 24 shaft compudobbies I decided on the 24 shaft 48" AVL. The width is partially because my other looms are approximately this width (one at 46" and one at 49") and the expense of new reeds would be avoided.

It will have one 1 yard sectional and one 1/2 yard sectional, both of these with 1" sections. Because the wire dividers are removeable, they are, in effect, plain beams when the wires are not in place.

The automatic cloth advance will wait until after the first of the year because by then the new high pick (up to 100) system should be available. Being fairly short at 5'4" I ordered the treadle blocks. I also went with the overhead beater with the single box fly shuttle. Being used to an overhead beater on my countermarche draw loom, the beating movement is familiar and actually preferred. Besides, if I ever want to go with the double box fly or more, the overhead beater is needed anyway.

The compudobby will be set up to go with a PC. (I use a Mac for our household stuff, but more weave design and driver software is available for the PC.) Now comes the fun of getting a new computer. After looking at the various PC magazines, it looks like the simple Gateway will do the trick. It will be rather amusing to email designs back and forth from the Mac (ProWeave) on the second floor to the PC in the loom room in the basement.

Delivery will have to wait until #1 husband and I return from our trip to Britain on October 9. This is to celebrate 40 years of not murdering each other. Assuming everything goes together pretty easily, the first project will be a dress shirt for him out of 30/2 tencel. Wouldn't it be nice if that could be done and sewn by Christmas.

When I took Madelyn's class at MAFA two years ago, this was the structure on my loom (it was a round-robin class). She called it something different then: Four Weaves, One Layer. Mine was an 8-shaft version, but in our class we also had a 12-shaft version. You can play with different treadlings with this threading, but what's neat about the "prescribed" treadling is that you get two very different & equally interesting sides. I think it would be great for a reversible coat or jacket. I'd like to use if for weaving scarves, but it seems to me that you're either going to have

long floats along the side where you carry the colors or you're going to drive yourself nuts ending each color neatly & starting the next. Did your group come up with a solution for that, Sharon? No, not reading Mr. O'C. But in the case of what Madelyn presented both as a sample for us to weave and the how to draft theory, you actually warp a dark warp and a light warp which exchange places...----alternating floats with plain weave across the shed. the floats move creating shapes...including circles after finishing instead of the squares present when you weave. Now as I look at the piece, the sample is dark on one side and light on the other. There are two layers of cloth and the floats shift or deflect as the cloth is wet finished thus Madelyn's name though I don't know if she invented that name. Further, I have no vested interest in the name but do want to use the drafting system I was introduced to in the workshop by that name. And it is a name that seems sensible to me in terms of what is happening in the sample. But, my experience with this weave by any name is limited so I am happy to defer to whomever and in this case I defer to my teacher. Sharon C. Albeit my samples stem from years past, but they are very much as you described. The "layers" as such are created by an unwoven group of weft threads floating over or under a group of warps (woven in plain weave), and/or vice versa. The blocks are threaded 1,2,1,2 . . .; 3,4,3,4 . . .; etc., with each color alternating side by side. In other words, there is only one warp, alternating in color, and it is also sett as one warp. As the weaving progresses there are times sections of warp are not being woven and other times sections of weft are floats. The result "deflects" once off the loom. (What a botched up description!!) This is not a weave that seems to improve with too many additional shafts (long floats).

Once again, I'm not knocking the name, I'll use whatever popular opinion deems proper, I'm merely asking if anyone can clarify why once the "false" was dropped the "double weave" was retained. The "deflected" still makes sense.

In this structure the two warps are threaded side by side, sleyed 1 per dent and areas of plain weave are connected by weft or warp floats. To me the real clue is that the tieups= for this structure have the form encountered in "traditional" double weav= of the type 1, 123, 2, 124 and so on. I like the way that Madelyn has shown weave structures for block double weave and for deflected double weave, both showing two cloth layers above each other. Of course in deflected double weave the woven areas of each layer are not directly abo= ve one another. The fact that these woven areas in each layer are connected= by weft floats is also shown very clearly. Perhaps one could argue that the deflection happens primarily off loom wh= en the fabric is washed, hence the word "deflected" is inappropriate when trying to describe the weave structure. I like it. I did some pieces, beginning with scarfs, then pullovers and ponchos. One will be in the last issue of "weaver's". My favorite material for this technique is merino wool 32/2. Taken off the loom, I put it into the washing machine and in the dryer-nealy cold-, and it comes out very soft. Funny also is, that as the floating threads come together, the design sometimes look as if I had put circles into it. I tried several colors- color-combinations. For me it is the best to have just two colors which "like each other". They come out clear, don't mix. Of course I learned it from Madelyn. Most of the programs will do fabric analysis. Some will import tiff and bmp files so you can create your draft in a draw/paint program. Lots of possiblities.

At the Japanese Fiber Symposium in NYC last fall. Junichi Arai was accompanied by a woman who wearing a woolen double weave shawl in which separate layers interlaced. The layers comprised areas of plain weave separated long warp and weft floats forming grids like so:

The floats interlaced to hold the layers together and were felted to keep the plain weave coming apart. Would this be considered a very loose deflected double weave?

The +'s represent a plain weave warp/weft intersection. Only the empty squares are empty spaces. The other empty areas just helped the characters line up in the diagram. The two layers sit over/under each other with the plain weave areas of one appearing in the empty spaces of the other.

The floats interlace to hold them together. By that I mean an entire section of warp floats rides over (or under) an entire section of weft floats. In the diagram below, the left warp floats would ride over weft floats if the right warp floats ride under weft floats. Further down the left warp floats would ride under weft floats while the right warp floats ride over weft floats. So it's a four block double weave, but is it a deflected double weave?

The shawl had a fairly coarse though lacey texture. The areas of double weave were probably 2"-3" square (it's hard to be precise while sketching what a stranger is wearing :) and the yarn had been felted. The shawl Paul has sounds much finer textured and has more layers. I'm looking forward to seeing it next summer!

I have a 24-harness George Wood (England)dobby hand loom and have just put on my first warp. It is a warp and filling clip-spot in merino wool on a hemp plain weave ground with most of the first few harnesses for the plain weave. I know now that I should have used more harnesses for the plain weave but I am having a little trouble getting a good shed on the back 20 harnesses for the clip-spot and have got my one treadle tied up very high, trying to get a good shed.

I have my harnesses getting higher (about 1 1/2 inch difference from front to back) and the warp is lying on the race. Are the harnesses getting higher from front to back at the correct angle? What level should the harnesses be compared to the resting warp (two inches below resting warp?) What height should my treadle be when at rest?

Having recently gone to several bookbinding classes, I am fascinated to discover many people who "have woven." A friend calls them "loom owners" as opposed to "weavers." Having been one of those for the first eight years of my weaving life, I have been thinking about what makes the transformation from loom owner to weaver. First, some will never make it. They enjoy fiber as a hobby, and they own a loom because you cannot weave without one, but they simply don't have the deep connection with weaving. Others are the born weavers who start off as beginners and within 6 months are working on cloth for their sister's wedding gown, or a matched set of overshot coverlets for family gifts. However, somewhere in the middle are the rest of us.

For me, the big Weaving List was the catalyst to think seriously about weaving as a craft, about the history of weaving, about the kinds of cloth that can be produced, about the various skills needed, and so on. And WeaveTech has expanded that experience further as I have developed better skills. Meeting good weavers at conferences and experiencing weaving at a different level than what appeared on my own loom has also been a help. I hypothesize that guilds who have a mentor or journeyman program can offer

that same kind of stimulus.

What about others on this list? What were the factors that moved you from "loom owner" to "weaver"?

While I was in Bozeman DH worked on my AVL. There were two areas that required attention, one I had previously posted to the list concerned the "flywheel" contraptions (inertial whatzits) on the beater. The other was the air assist.

My AVL now has the flywheels something like the Churchill Looms. These are beater stroke regulators and the benefit I was looking for was to reduce the amount of impact of my underslung beater. With the four box air assist weight crashing into the beater stops of the loom, the impact vibration transferred to my hand and up my arm to my neck.

The fly wheels have counterweights on them which also help to reduce the amount of physical exertion required to keep beating - which is considerable for the underslung format.

More importantly, the impact \*has\* been reduced - something that will, I hope, allow my pinched nerve and numb hand to heal. The beater did not cause my problem, but was preventing me from achieving recovery.

(The three month weaving hiatus strongly recommended by the sports medicine dr just was not an option!)

Several people have indicated an interest in what Doug has done, and I have made arrangements with the ANWG web master to have pictures

posted in the Article section of the site. I got film last night, and hope to get pictures taken and sent in the next few weeks. I will post again and let people know when they are up.

The second area of concern was the actual air assist. After 12 and a bit months, I was experiencing excessive air leakage and after receiving conflicting information from a technician in Vancouver, and AVL, we finally found a pneumatics company here in Prince George who was able, \*and\* interested enough, to give us some service regarding new foot valves and spoolers. (I had chosen to have foot valves rather than thumb switches for the air shuttle and the original shuttle and shaft air systems were different.)

Now all five (shuttle & shaft) valves & spoolers are the same brand and easily repairable. These valves are cheaper than the original replacements. However, it took a complete re-plumbing(?) of the air lines, a new wooden safety box for the foot treadles and the addition of two (stereo type 12 volt) electrical switches to complete the shuttle change. Doug says most of the extra work was due to moving the regulators off the loom to the wall beside me which was necessary due to the configuration of the loom in the studio.

Our new supplier suggested a new air/electric system but we wanted to use as many of the existing parts as we could. Doug now fully endorses the air/electric system as it would be easier to convert, operate and maintain. (A 12 volt system is the same power that runs boom boxes, etc.)

The fly wheels still need some minor fine tuning, but basically I'm happy with this system. The air assist - well, only time will tell. Our climate has been unusually humid which has caused a lot of the problems with the system, but at least now I have a local supplier who can get me parts within two days, and no border/customs hassles to deal with. And if I win the lottery, I may even re-build it again (well, get Doug to!) and convert to the air/electric system the local people are recommending.

The good news is that my system is \*not\* contaminated, as had been suggested by a tech at AVL, and even if the switches only last as long as the originals, they are cheaper to replace.

Kathy -

My experiences with having apprentice or apprentice-like people in my weaving business was, just as you noted, that they quickly lose interest or else find the work too boring.

My solution has been to go to contract work (piece work). I studied my business carefully and discovered which steps I could safely hand over to others without losing control and quality. For me I was able to farm out the actual weaving of some of my tableware which is done in plain weave as well as my basic sewing and finishing. I found that it was easier to teach someone to weave what was needed rather than hire someone who already knew how to weave.

Rather than hire someone with an interest in weaving and craft, I looked at people who wanted to do work at home or during their own choice of hours. I interview and selected people who I call "process" people. In other words, people who would make good file clerks or bookkeepers, who don't want to have an emotional or creative involvement with their work. My initial mistake was in hiring people who were much the same as myself. However, I really wanted to get rid of the boring tasks and keep the creative and designing tasks. I am now down to just one weaver and a sewer from a high of four weavers. But Doug has been with me for about four years and my sewer (before I moved away) had been with me for almost nine years.

I set up a contract outlining what I provide (warp beam with  $\_\_$  number of yards of warp, weft yarns, worksheet, and rate of pay per item) and what they are to provide ( a minimum of  $\_\_$  items per month, that pass certain

quality standards as to selvedges, beat, error correction, etc.) I only pay for items which meet the standards we have agreed on. I have a similar contract for the sewer which covers quality of stitching, finishing methods etc. This allows me to control the product design, warp set-up, choice of wefts, quality of finishing, etc. but lets me hand off the repetitive areas of the production.

After a weaver has learned the skills required and worked at their own location successfully, I have on occasion had them work at my studio with me say, for example, three mornings a week, doing specific duties such as inventory, marketing, order filling, or other tasks which don't require creative output and need a minimum of explanation.

Problem solving, pride in work (But I have no idea where it is now!) and distraction from "the divorce" Then I became a weaver for real. It kept me off the morbid thoughts and self absorption. I could weave, plan, design and not have to think about "the divorce" I was always a fibre person and wove in briefly in grade school. This told me that it was something I wanted to do again. So when the classes came up, I went, wove in class and the rest is history. After IWC this summer (and a wonderful class with Diane, by the way!), I had a chance to visit Irvin Trujillo, a Chimayo weaver who carries on the traditional weaving of his family. He does exactly the same thing. We met his cousin, who weaves at home and knew nothing about weaving until he started working for Irvin and Lisa. They do the designing, spinning and dyeing and contract out some of the actual weaving.

It is hard for us to imagine someone approaching weaving in the same way one would approach a temp filing job, but it clearly can be that and for production weaving, that may be the best arrangment for the business owner.

By the way, Irvin and Lisa may be joining WeaveTech. And if you are in New Mexico and go to Chimayo (and which weaver would not?), they own Centinela Weaving.

My solution has been to go to contract work (piece work). I studied my business carefully and discovered which steps I could safely hand over to others without losing control and quality. For me I was able to farm out the actual weaving of some of my tableware which is done in plain weave as well as my basic sewing and finishing. I found that it was easier to teach someone to weave what was needed rather than hire someone who already knew how to weave.

I wonder if it might be possible to contact a nearby college or university art department and offer an internship. This could be by contract with both the student and the department. The student could get a specified number of credits, and you would have the apprentice for a known & knowable period of time. I would think a minimum would be a full school year--enough for it to have been worth your time to train the person. You would probably have to write periodic & perhaps a final evaluation of the student's performance, but perhaps the school/department already has a model that you could follow.

Has anyone tried this approach?

HI Kathy,

I should introduce myself to the list since I have been lurking for months. I am a limited production weaver with four contract weavers and two contract seamstresses. I produce outerwear garments (jackets and scarves). I share a studio/shop with 5 other weavers. I also am an arts administrator for the Sawtooth Center for Visual Art in Winston-Salem, NC. During my 17 years as the Fiber Department Coordinator at Sawtooth I have hired six apprentices. Since Diane spoke to the contract apprentices I will focus on the student apprentice.

Most of the these apprentices were in college, looking for credit for an arts admin. class. Some were very lazy and some are now at the top of their field. The word apprentice is often use to mean cheap help. I think it is more about teaching and providing insight to a profession. My most recent apprentice was Meredith, a 17 year old, who had learned to weave at Sawtooth. She was hired thought a program call Artiva with our local Arts Council. Artiva hires 14 to 21 year olds who wish to work in the arts and they get a reality check. They are paid minimum wage for 160 hours over 6 weeks in the summer.

Meredith worked on any project needing attention; sewing on buttons, shop upkeep, inventory, and weaving cloth. A lot of time was spent on the details of the task, she readily took in the information and I never has to explain the task again. She has worked with us for the last two summers and is truly a gem. She has helped me regain my faith in teenagers in the work place. I believe an apprentice should have an interest in the field, some knowledge is good and a willingness to keep learning. Now, I have had the opposite happen with teenagers as well, but why go there.

Local apprenticeship for University credit is a great idea! I would welcome such an offer where I teach. The Master Weaver would have to

present a written plan to the professor granting credit, which would outline the sort of work the student was to do and require 12-15 hours per week for 3 hours semester credit. I would be most interested in a proposal that allowed the student a chance to see how your business is run -- even if that just means working in the same room with you while you work, take phone calls and meet with clients. At the end of the semester you would assign a grade.

Only seniors have the option of doing an internship, so you would be getting an apprentice who already had quite a bit of technical and creative training. Seniors in my program have experience with both mx and sabrachron fiber reactive dyes and indigo as well as bleach and thiox discharge. They have computer weave structure design skills and a wide range of exposure to weave structures including warp and weft faced weaves, brocades, tapestry, block designing and color effect weaves. They have done both warp and weft ikat and warp painting. Most degree programs offer an internship credit option, but few students would be able to do this for more than one semester, unless they extended their graduation date or weren't on a four year plan. On the other hand, if you made an ongoing arrangement with a school to take a student each semester, you would soon know what you could expect the student to know, and could tailor your training to take advantage of that.

I am rather fortunate in that I have not needed a lot of assistance but for a while worked with Doug who had specific areas of work to do that were sales oriented, plus helping with beaming, inspecting, and finishing.

At the moment, I have two part time helpers, each with quite different but valuable skills. Both are weavers, one is a tapestry weaver, the other an ex-student (helpful in that as I taught her, she uses my methods!)

Rather than contract out, the majority of their working time is spent in-studio and I pay a flat rate on a casual basis - a grey area in employment standards in Canada. Basically it means that because they come in on an as-need basis, and can refuse hours without prejudice, they are not "employees". Works for us so far.

They both take some work home - fringe twisting, for example, but that is definately a "seasonal" type of thing and not on-going.

Their skills overlap in terms of the "process" - either can beam a warp, inspect, do finishing etc. Each has a very different colour sense, and I encourage them to "play" and design afghan warps, over which I have final say in terms of sett and actual yarns used. For instance I may veto a particular yarn because of unsuitability for warp, or I may give them a cone of textured/varigated yarn and tell them to "live it up". Weft choices and structure are mine.

These afghans are more collaborative than most weaver/designers but I'm not a colourist, and both of my helpers are.

Also, because I am used to being an 'elf' for others, I suppose my ego isn't as tied up in the designing process.

My tags say "Laura Fry Weaving Studio" - thus as the "master" of the studio, I feel that I am not overstepping the bounds by using my helpers talents. It gives them some sense of creative satisfaction, too.

That is not to say that egos don't from time to time, clash. This is the time for the parties involved to step back, take a deep breath, and get back to work.

I suppose that because all three of us \*need\* to earn an income somehow, and because we all enjoy the process of weaving in some way, that we are highly motivated to get the job done.

I have a feeling that you're taking this wrong, Dan. What I read into what Judith had written was that there are some people out there who own looms but who do not weave. The question then becomes: How do you inspire that person to weave? For Judith, the inspiration came from joining an Internet weave list & conversing w/ several hundren people worldwide about weaving.

When I went to the "Care & Feeding of an AVL" class (that's not what they call it, but you know what I mean) at Chico last spring, perhaps more than half of my class of nine people owned AVLs but were too intimidated to use them. Of course, such people would self-select in favor of taking such a class, but it \*does\* reinforce the idea that people own looms that, for one reason or another, they don't use.

Anyhow, I certainly don't read Judith's question as a snob issue--perhaps in part b/c I know Judith, and a less snobby, more down-to-earth person you probably could not find anywhere.

I've been cohabiting with my new AVL for two weeks now, and thought I would report on our adventures. I spent the first week assembling the loom, with occasional physical help from my husband (where four hands were required) and telephone help from Ken at AVL. As so many of you on the list said, the directions for putting the loom together are generally excellent, and I had very little trouble. One problem remains (in the cloth storage system--so it doesn't interfere w/ weaving), and solving that awaits a replacement part. I probably screwed it up when I installed it, and AVL is being \*very\* nice about it. No one has said, "Ruth, you jerk, you made a total hash out of installing your cloth storage system."

I would add a footnote to the comment that the directions are good: the directions for installing the CompuDobby are not as good as the directions for assembling the loom. When it came to installing the CD, I was extra, extra glad I had been to AVL's class first, had had ample opportunity to weave on the various models of looms, was at least a little bit familiar with the CD, and had been shown how to troubleshoot problems.

And so, on to weaving! I've been weaving on the loom (48" full frame, 16 shafts) for a week now. I put on a dishtowel warp ("Oh, what the heck, it's only a dishtowel") for probably 6 dishtowels (7 yds). The feel of this loom is so different from anything I've used previously, that I'm just spending my time learning how I need to beat, how far I can advance the cloth, etc. I threaded for 16-shaft straight draw, and at the moment, I'm just using designs from Oelsner. I'd rather spend my time learning the

loom at this point, rather than designing from scratch.

The loom has a fly shuttle, but I decided not to present myself with too many challenges on the first warp. I'm using a hand-thrown efs (Bluster Bay), and it's going pretty well. I had put on floating selvages, but after the first few towels, I cut them off. I've heard from others that they largely just ignore the problem of not catching every edge thread, and it usually doesn't matter.

And I now have this great image of all you AVL users out there: You all have quads of steel on your right leg, and a semi-atrophied left leg. <ggg>

It's been a great learning experience so far, and I'm deeply (and publicly) grateful to AVL for their support.

Allen wrote:

I stand by my simple, original position, I am a weaver therefore I own a loom. Without a loom I am not a weaver and if I owned a loom and didn't weave I'd not be a weaver. A weaver is someone who BOTH owns a loom AND weaves.

This is elegantly and simply put. It does leave me wondering, however, about the definition of "loom". Some looms exist only when they are in work. Without a warp, they are common sticks and bits of string. Aleast 10 or 20 of these (sometimes unrecognizeable) looms are scattered around my house. I'd like to (ever so gently) remind us that just as it's possible to weave with a machine that gives help to almost every part of the process, it's also possible to move the other direction and weave with a minimum of equipment between the weaver and the cloth. This is not to suggest that one way is better than the other, but I find it worthwhile to remember that the loom only influences the \*loom-controlled\* complexity of a piece of cloth. The ultimate complexity is up to the weaver.

Personally, if I were wandering through a forest with a bundle of yarn and had to weave something, I wouldn't fail to call myself a weaver just because I hadn't smoothed some sticks down yet. For that matter, I wouldn't fail to call myself a weaver if I had to chase down a sheep and spin something first.

It's a simple loom in that respect and doesn't have the necessary front cloth beam to support the Auto Advance. The new AA should be easier to advance manually and it reverses easier as well. It is still on schedule for the end of the year, give or take a bit. And, the 30" Studio Dobby Loom has been shipping for a few weeks now. It has all the great features of the 20" with a wider weaving area. Both looms also have a very deep weaving space so you can really see your pattern develop, and you don't have to advance very often. Carrie,

I certainly do agree that the loom only affects the \*loom-controlled\* complexity of a cloth, and that the ultimate complexity depends upon the imagination and skill of the weaver. I would go further to say any loom puts limits on the complexity of cloth that can only be overcome by the skill, ingenuity and perserverance of the weaver.

It is very difficult for me to believe people actually argue that owning a piece of equipment is a defining characteristic of a weaver, especially since floor looms have only been widely available for less than a thousand years. What about all the wonderful cloth made before that ? Or the amazing fabrics produced by people who lack floor looms ( or for that matter, floors) ? Understanding cloth and how to manipulate threads to make it is what makes a weaver in my mind.

Of course, in our society we distinguish textile workers by the processes they use, drawing lines between weavers, braiders, knitters, and others. Will we only admit to weaver status those who make fabrics that contain wefts ? How about those like ancient peruvians who could change the role of threads from warp to weft and back again without difficulty.

Seems to me these certainly should be considered weavers, especially by complex weavers. Or even the plaiting of the northern plain Indians, where single elements changed from a warp-like role to a weft-like role at the selvedges.

We could go farther. Most of my andean friends would not consider a weaver very skilled or completely formed unless they designed the yarns ofr the project, since the spin and characterisitc of the yarn has such a dramatic affect on the final product. Certainly they would have difficulty accepting someone as a complex weaver if they just took yarns off the shelf and used them as they came from the box; at the very least they should be respun to achieve the desired affect. But then, they weave on the simplest of looms and readily make some very complex cloth, including crossed warp tubes, rolled edges, automatic symmetrical patterning, two faced three color warps, and even deflected warps.

The machine that Tim uses to create a "water-splice" is designed for cotton and is a common industry item. When you come upon a knot the yarn is broken at the knot and the two ends are put into the splicer. It uses water and compressed air to blow the fibers apart and then blows them back together intertwining the fibers and leaving you with a solid piece of yarn. The Illman splice is a process by another machine that takes the two ends of the yarn and wraps them with a monofilament creating a knotless splice. Ring temples function to keep the woven cloth spread out just like a regular temple does, except they do not have to be moved. The temples mount under the woven cloth just past the fell line. They consist of a number of small spiked rings over an axle, so they can roll with the cloth. The rings are mounted at an angle so they constantly spread the edges of the cloth out thereby helping with drawin. An elegant but not inexpensive solution. Tom @ AVL info@avlusa.com

Imagine a small tube of plain weave cloth, made by passing the weft from only one direction and pulling it tight so that the "selvedges" meet. Only one face of the fabric is visible; the other face is permanently hidden on the inside of the tube. Since it's hidden, float length and arrangement don't matter on the inside. Therefore, you can freely arrange warps for each pick out of their normal cross order.

I have only made one kind of these tubes. In the sort I know, there is what I think of as a background color, and three additional colors in smaller amounts. The additional colors move back and forth inside the tube to create a pattern of concentric diamonds or "eyes" which appear at different points on the tube. If you look at the outside of the structure, it appears that color 1 is brought to the face between two background warps; then color 2 is brought to the face between color 1 on the next pick; then color three is brought up between color 2 for the center of the eye. The order of the additional colors can be changed freely for each new diamond. The background warps undulate back and forth around the diamonds.

A picture makes it much clearer. Try "Traditional Textiles of the Andes". I vaguely recall there is a chapter on finishing details which should have a good photo. (Sorry I do not have more complete inof on the book at this time). This technique is sometimes called "tubular edging" or "nawi awapa". The tube can be sewn to the edge of an existing cloth by passing the weft through the existing cloth between picks. There can also be more than three colors for the diamonds, with a corresponding increase in the number of background ends.

As with so many things, seeing it once makes far more sense than any amount of my words. It is surprisingly simple to do once you leave behind any worry about preserving warp order and what the back of the cloth looks like. Though I haven't seen examples, I imagine the same technique could be used with different textures and/or sizes of threads to create a different look than the diamond pattern. A monochromatic example might even be interesting, if the yarns were large enough so that the undulation of the warps was very apparent.

I posted something on this topic a while ago and never saw it in a digest. So if you received it and I somehow missed getting the digest it appeared in, my apologies.

The topic that interests me is the difference between the weaving instruction books we weavers learn from and technical manuals like Oelsner and Watson. The former start with tabby, twills and satins and then go into traditional block weaves. The technical manuals, after dealing with tabby, twill and satin, explore weaves like rep, backed and stuffed weaves, layered weaves, crepes, brocades, and so on, but don't touch the supplementary weft block weaves familiar to handweavers.

I think I can see why there is this difference. Individual weaving enthusiasts are usually limited to harness looms where block weaves can expand design capability, while the technical manuals are written for industrial use where dobby looms are often employed. I would imagine that two-shuttle weaves would be avoided by industry. I'd like to know more about the reasons for these differences. Why do the instruction books written for us follow pretty much the same pattern, and who was responsible for developing the pattern? Are my speculations about the more technical manuals correct?

Carrie's given a good description of one kind of crossed warp tubular weave. Perhaps I should add that this is completely warp faced, and that the "background" color warps actually interlace with warp twining as well as plain weaving in order to make space for the pattern yarns to appear.

Another kind of tube hides a color in the center of the tube and "explodes" it onto the surface in the center of the pattern eyes.

The same tubular principle is used to make rolled selvedges. The weft yarn passes through the selvedge threads from one direction only, and therefore weave the selvedges only every other pick. A very nice finish. Who out there weaves this rooled edge on a floor loom ? How is it accomplished ?

There are several major differences between books which are targeted to the domestic handloom weaving market and those which are used by the trade and you have cited but one of these differences. The major difference is one of writing style. Books for the textile trade are written in an objective technical style with which some handloom weavers are a bit uneasy. This style is possible because in the trade the reader has a much broader, more well trained background in basic technical matters and is accustomed to reading a style which is actually more clear and direct.

Not all books used in the textile trade deal strictly with the weaves you indicated. Actually, many of the weave seemingly favored by handloom weavers are in some ways found in production at various times depending on the then currently popular designs. I have a whole rack of facrics from regular mill production which use weaves you mentioned, but in the trade these weaves are not given names which handloom weavers would recognise. Rather they are called by a more generic nomenclature indicating the basic weave from which they may have been derived. Or, they aren't called anything at all since in fact, we communicate w

This is not correct since shaft looms are shaft looms regardless of whether they are a hand or power machine. Treadle handlooms are no different then dobbies except in their limited number of available shed with each set-up.

> I would imagine that two-shuttle weaves would be avoided by industry.

This is completely wrong. Multiple shuttle looms and now shuttless looms for multiple fillings have been used in the trade for decades. We had looms which used up to four shuttles in one range and up to seven in the other. Shuttless looms can be equipped with more fillings than that. There is no so called supplementary filling block weave done by handloom weavers that could not be woven with any common mill equipment. It isn't done because the general trade has no use for these kinds of designs at this point but could should they become popular. Again, it's too easy to assume that mills cannot do what handloom weavers do rather than accept the more difficult fact that mills choose, for design reason, not to.

>I'd like to know more about the reasons for these differences. Why do the >instruction books written for us follow pretty much the same pattern, and >who was responsible for developing the pattern? Are my speculations about >the more technical manuals correct?

Basically, my thinking on the problem over the years has pretty well convinced me that the difference exists because handloom weavers want to maintain what for me has always been a meaningless distinction between themselves and the larger industry of which they are a part. Authors of books for the handloom trade usually have no mill experience and little or no knowledge of mill operation. There is no one in particular who is responsible for this situation. Rather, I believe it to be systemic for reasons that have more to do with the psycho-sociology of the handloom field than with anything technical.

Thanks, Allan, for giving us insight on the industrial perspective on the various weaves and weave manuals; I find the information you have given is enlightening and interesting. At one point you say:

> I have a whole rack of facrics from >regular mill production which use weaves you mentioned, but in the trade >these weaves are not given names which handloom weavers would recognise. >Rather they are called by a more generic nomenclature indicating the basic >weave from which they may have been derived. Or, they aren't called >anything at all since in fact, we communicate weaves among trade colleagues >with the drafts rather than by name since this is much more accurate.

I am curious to know what some of the generic nomenclature is. My question is not so much a practical one as just a desire to know as much as possible about the differences between industrial and handloom weaving.

On the subject of books for handweavers, you say:

> Authors of >books for the handloom trade usually have no mill experience and little or >no knowledge of mill operation. There is no one in particular who is >responsible for this situation. Rather, I believe it to be systemic for >reasons that have more to do with the psycho-sociology of the handloom field >than with anything technical.

True, but there is a certain pattern to the way these books are put together. I would like to know why and what the sources for this information is. Was Atwater or Tidball responsible for the first book of this nature? Whoever was the first, where did this person look to for infomation? I have a vague impression that these books derive from the pattern books of the itinerant German weavers who plied their trade in the northeastern part of the U.S. in the early 19th century, but, as you can see, I am often wrong about such matters. Again, knowing more about handloom weave manuals would be of little practical value, but definitely of historical interest.

Enough speculation on my part for today. I'd better get back to my weaving!

This is partly true since in those days, the very days which are most influential on today's American handloom weavers, patterns were the focus more so than structure and weavers who were not particularly designerly or who didn't wish to design wanted specific directions as to how to make a particular pattern. It's much like fly tying can be, where people learn to tie specific patterns rather than learn the entomology, then the fundamental structure of various classes of trout flies and finally march off on their own to create any pattern of their own design.

Interestingly, from a pedagogical perspective, teaching people the essential but frequently dull fundamentals from which they are then equipped to really push their own creative envelopes is not always met with much positive acceptance. I can recall teaching a group of adults a workshop at which the only product was a radical increase in their understanding of fabric structure but little or no goodies were made according to specific pattern directions. Very few got the point at first because of previous expectations.

Likewise, when I teach kids to tie trout flies, following the entomology part, I teach them to tie various parts of macroinvertebrate anatomy with which skill any one of these kids can open a pattern book and tie any pattern selected at random without having either seen the pattern previously or having bee show how to tie it.

HI Lois....the factors which make the fabric crinkle when taken off the loom are a combination of weave structure and overtwisted wool yarn. Collapse effects can also be created by using fibers with very different shrinkage rates, so when wet finished they will collapse differently and create a very beautiful effect. Liz is definitely the master of this! There are numerous articles in past issues of WEAVERS magazines on collapse weaves.

Hello WeaveTech,

We are working on aspects of the wet ring spinning process for producing flax or linen yarn from flax rove. We are investigating a new processing method which permits grey flax rove to be wet ring spun seemingly as easily as the traditional quite heavily bleached flax rove. Any changes in spinning technology obviously impacts on the weaver. Let me suggest an explanation for the differences in nomenclature between handweavers and the generic nomenclature. I think Anne Ryeburn

is on the right track. The hand-weavers nomenclature derives from the days when weavers went through an extended apprentice program and weaving jargon ( ashorthand way about talking about what you did) developed, rahter as it does with acronyms in most (if not all) technical fields today. Thus, the names of the patterns and particularly sub-patterns were a mutually understood shorthand that enabled hand-weavers to communicate over a pint of ale at the end of the day. It not only speeded conversation but it also shwed that you were part of the 'in' crowd, the fraternity.

The modern (say post WWII) commercial weaving professional come primarily out of engineering schools and industrial/art design schools where they took a goodly number of weaving courses dealing with fabric sturcture and technology. Patterns, as Allen points out, fall into the category of 'you want a pattern I'll give you a pattern'.

I have a feeling that handweavers perpetuate the pattern based nomenclature because they value pattern over structure. This statement is not intended as a value judgement but as a statement of differences in perspective. How many times have you seen 'this pattern can be woven in several different structures' as part of a description of someone's favorite pattern. Further, for hand weavers the in-crowd effect clearly is still very important. Evidence: look at the importance of being able to describe things by the label attached to them rather than by desciption in any guild based proficiency program. This is not a trivial issue -- since time immemorable, Homo sapiens has felt that naming something gives one power over it. Until recently this was true in the medicine as much as in weaving and many other areas. Medicine has, to a large extent outgrown this; hand-weaving clearly is struggling with it; commercial weavers were forced out of it because of the diversity of backgrounds from which the practitioners derive.

I remind everyone: the above is proposed as a hypothesis, not as fact.

Tubular double weave is a neat idea for selvedges. You could also do a rolled selvedge on a floor loom this way:

pick 1: raise shaft 3. Shuttle will go from B to D. pick 2: raise shaft 1. Shuttle will go from C to A. This turns the right selvedge over itself; D meets C. pick 3: raise shaft 4. Shuttle goes from B to D. This turns the left selvedge over itself; A meets B. pick 4: raise shaft 2. Shuttle goes from C to A...

I'm assuming that on picks 1 - 4 whatever needs to happen in the main cloth is being taken care of too. Depending on the structure of the main cloth, it may matter whether the selvedge threads nearest the main cloth are evens or odds. The selvedges weave at half the ppi of the main cloth. The challenge that comes to mind is denting. If dented normally, there will be a lot of wear on the edge threads, and the beating won't encourage the rolled edge. Depending on the denting scheme all selvege threads could be put in one dent. Or use a reed the width of the cloth and let the selvedges be just outside the reed, or use a reed with cahngeable dents.

A nifty solution. I agree one must be careful with the boundary of selvedge and cloth, depending upon the structure of the weave. The denting may not be so great a problem, as even in backstrap situations (with no reed), the roll really happens several picks back from the fell of the cloth and must be encouraged with occasional twists of the weaver's fingers.

In fact, it came up because in a social setting, I mentioned that I had just been to Albuquerque for Intermountain Weavers and someone asked if I was a weaver. The conversation went on with them saying that they owned a loom but hadn't woven anything on it in years -- so someone joked that they were a "loom owner" rather than a weaver. I think that we all go through those dry periods when the loom stands unwarped, or a dog has been on it so long that we aren't sure we remember how to warp (or is it just me and Dan????). During those times, I think that we wonder if we are loom owners or weavers . . . a clever turn of phrase that speaks not to mechanical vs creative, but to what keeps us weaving. I am less interested in how we can move people into being weavers, than in what motivates each of us to make the bone deep connection with the process of creating textiles -- one in which, as Ed Franguemont says so well, the loom itself can become irrelevant and we are "in the flow." No offense taken Dan!

How many times have you seen 'this pattern can be woven > in several different structures' as part of a description of someone's > favorite pattern. Further, for hand weavers the in-crowd effect clearly > is still very important. Evidence: look at the importance of being able

> to describe things by the label attached to them rather than by > desciption in any guild based proficiency program. This is not a > trivial issue -- since time immemorable, Homo sapiens has felt that > naming something gives one power over it. I understood from visiting Liz's classes, and hearing her lecture, that the collapse weave was caused by her use of a lycra thread as a weft which, when washed, went into folds and pleats. The handle is rather harsh.

I have just finished putting on a collapse weave warp of 25 m, which would persist in collapsing while I was winding the warp. It took me a week and bad language to get it on the loom. I was at a mill a while ago, and in their reject bin I found a lot of skeins of over twisted wool which they were going to throw out. They were so surprised at my excitement, and wondered why anyone would want it, so I took a collapse weave wrap out to show them. This weft does beat re-spinning commercial yarn on my spinning wheel.

Weaver's 44 (the current and last one) has an article by Liz Williamson covering her differential shrinkage scarves. She visited my school last year and gave us a slide show of her work. She uses lycra/wool yarn that is heat activated during finishing to shrink. She puts a lot of work into sampling both yarns and finishing to develop her effects.

A friend took her class at Penland this summer and came back with some lovely multiple selvedge double weave scarves reminiscent of Liz' earlier work as well as a less lovely loosely woven scarf that appeared to be woven with an elastic weft in plain weave.

Hi All,

Some of the 19th century weavers' manuscripts have names for designs and many do not. Some have intriquing ones like "copied from Widow Graves coverlit" and others are so & so's "patron", obviously copied from that person's work or shared by that person. Others have the names one would

expect to find -"Laurel Blossom", "Potato Blossom", etc. Most designs have no names and many, many early draft books haven't a word of German or English in them. The earliest patterns with names that I have seen are the Snavely ones[1740's]. Structure names are useful when talking to another weaver but the general public could care less, unless it is a "cute" name.

I wanted to let everyone know what is really going on with TISS. Several years ago they were bought out by their largest customer, the giant paper making company Albany International. Albany uses the TISS heads in their papermaking machinery to join the huge cloth rollers that the paper slurry is spread on in the process of making paper. Seams in the roller are unacceptable so they use the jacquard heads to weave the ends of the rollers together. Last year, in a move to consolidate their operations, Albany closed the TISS plant in Lyon, France, and moved the TISS operation in house to their own plant in Sellistat (sp?) France. They also removed the long time manager of TISS and took that over as well. In short, the TISS Jacquard Heads are available and so are parts. Allen Fannin is correct in that they are a bit pricey, but they are also the only commercially available head that is of a size to fit on a handloom. The Bonas head is wonderful but it's also nearly the size of a Volkswagen. Hardly appropriate to put over a handloom. Until something smaller and more economical is developed it's a great system. In my experience, the first time I met women who clearly were "loom owners" and not weavers was when I moved upstate NY and joined a guild for the first time in my 20 years of weaving. This guild had begun in the 50's, and a few of the members who had taught each other to weave then were still members. They were, of course, fairly old in the early 90's, when I joined them, but they had many things in common besides.

They all owned looms. They never wove anything, but brought knitted or embroidered items for show and tell. They could "talk the talk" and knew all the names for all the weaves, and had maybe tried 50% of them once, in a workshop. They refused to let the guild change to accomodate new weavers whose schedules did not allow for Tues. morning into afternoon meetings.

IMHO, they had stopped being weavers some time ago, and the guild had deteriorated into a Club for Loom Owners. They were lovely women, and I enjoy being with weavers (there were a few newer weavers), so I stayed a member, but the experience was such that when I moved out of the area, my first thought was not to find a guild.

Since they were largely self-taught, from the books available at the renaissance of weaving in the 50's, their understanding of drafting and original weave design was limited. And, I think, ultimately, this led to their stopping weaving, as they had duplicated about all the patterns they found of interest, and were without the resources to go farther with anything.

AAF is right on target in his analysis of the difference in manuals for the industry and for handweavers. In the industry, we never "named" any weave. There was, occasionally, a color and weave effect pattern, much like the "deflected double cloth" which resembled a "dog bone" and for shorthand reference in the studio, we would say "use the doggy bone weave chain" but we didn't think of it as anything but a convenience. Other weave chains were given numbers, logged in a book kept by both us and the mill.

Toni asks if straight or point threading is a name or description, and I'd say it's a description. Rosepath is a name. Deflected Double Cloth is a name, and for Madelyn to preface her article with the admission that we don't \*need\* more of these made-up names and then to proceed to make up a new one, just drives me up the wall (ask my DH, he's endured many a rant, if any of y'all ever meet him, please thank him for bearing the brunt of what I'd have dumped here otherwise).

Sorry this went on so long, I've been mulling this for days, and thought to stay out of the fray, but common sense lost out again <g>.

Bonni in Jersey City, NJ - who first felt comfortable calling herself a Weaver when someone wanted to trade for a wall hanging done at Haystack

(1978), and it was fine, I knew that I could not only weave another, but the next would be better, so I could let go of this one.

In 1996, Portland, I pawed over a good number of Liz's scarves. The ones using wool wrapped Lycra were generally double weave, very soft to the touch, great hand. Lycra is basically elastic and doe its thing pretty quickly, I'm not sure you have to resort to fulling even! I have a commercial scarf where Lycra has been used, sans any wrapping, carried with the weft on certain picks, it's nigh on invisible! I could see the "collapse" effect, determined it wasn't from "collapse" yarn so I resorted to magnifier and bodkin to dig it out. The scarves that Liz displayed in 1996 that did have a harsh hand were generally the ones in which she'd experimented with monofilament (yes, fine fishing line type of stuff) not the Lycra wrapped. These books are about really wonderful, awe-inspiring textiles. Ed, your contributions to the Meisch book make me marvel at the breadth of your knowledge.

The reason that I'm writing is to direct listers who want to know more about tubular (and many other) edgings from the Andes to consult the D'Harcourt book -- he has incredibly interesting and explicit directions for many of the techniques used in the several hundred pieces that are shown in (unfortunately) black/white photos.

One thing I have come to appreciate from these books is how integrated the fiber artists of the Andes were and are. Combining braiding, twining, weaving, knotting, embroidery (etc.) in a "form follows function" kind of way, but with a striking sense of design, colour and structure (and maybe

coded messages too!).

This passage caught my eye, as my own current passion is tablet weaving. This exerpt is from Chapter 8 -- Fabrics Made of Twisted Warp or Weft: Passementerie, Page 62:

"Bands with Twisted Warp Yarns -- Up to the present, I have found this technique used predominantly on quite narrow bands or ribbons; there is theoretically nothing to prevent its use for wider pieces. The appearance of these bands is that of lines of adjacent chain stitches. The method of predure is as follows. The warp yarns are twisted around each other in pairs, with regular alternation of the direction of twisting; that is to say, a pair twisted from right to left is followed by a pair twisted from left to right. At each spiral the weft glides between the two yarns, thus holding the crossing firm and fastening the pairs of yarns to each other. It can be seen that the procedure and results are very closely related to those of "card weaving," but the Peruvians do not seem to have known the potentialities of this weaving technique; they did not proceed beyond this initial stage. Moreover, no small boards with holes or similar articles used in card weaving have been found among the material taken from graves."

By the way, does the word "Passementerie" mean a twined band, as implied here? What does HGA think "Passementerie" means? ;'D

The same issue contains an article by David Fraser & Peter Collingwood, "Kurji and Paket: Inscribed, Twined Bags of Jain Itinerant Merchants in Western Rajasthan."

This scholarly journal on textiles is one of the benefits of membership in the Textile Museum, and is worth the whole price of membership.

End of week three of cohabiting w/ my new AVL <ggg>

The loom part that I had botched up when I installed it has been replaced by AVl, and now I can not only weave but wind the cloth onto the cloth storage system. For all future AVL assemblers: beware the two cords at the top of the cloth storage weight. It's easy to get them crossed (because of how you have to install them) and crossing them really screws things up.

Most frequent weaving error: make a correction (meaning I have to put the driver in reverse), then merrily keep weaving, forgetting that I'm in reverse. Then comes the agonizing decision: do I just weave the rest of the towel in reverse? Or do I go forward again? Do I see nods of understanding all around the world? Have you all done this? Sure makes me feel like a dope to look up at the computer & see that I'm weaving backwards.

At Janet's urging, I finally hooked up the flyshuttle today. I've woven four dishtowels hand-thrown, but after the first two or three, I got rid of the floating selvages, so I really could take the fs out for a spin. I wove a dishtowel in about one-fourth the time it's been taking me. I may pay for it tomorrow in my arms, and particularly in my right elbow, which is slowly, slowly recovering from tendinitis. I did find that it was easy to switch hands, so I mostly worked the fs with the left & beat with the right. Beating seems to wreak less wear & tear on the sore elbow.

After this warp is done (one more dishtowel), the next mountain to climb will be sectional warping.

This is a ball!

>We are working on aspects of the wet ring spinning process for >producing flax or linen yarn from flax rove. We are investigating a >new processing method which permits grey flax rove to be wet ring >spun seemingly as easily as the traditional quite heavily bleached >flax rove.

The only linen I've woven was Bockens 16/1 wet spun and it was lovely but very expensive. There is a proposal under consideration in California (where I live) to legalize hemp as an industrial and agricultural crop. Would your new spinning machinery work with hemp so that eventually it might cost less than flax, and be more attractive to handweavers?

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By the way, does the word "Passementerie" mean a twined band, as implied here? What does HGA think "Passementerie" means? Dot Schmader is not on this list, but provided the following answer to me. Lyn Day

First let me say that while HGA sponsors Convergence, please remember that it is put on by volunteers. As a volunteer on the Convergence steering committee and in charge of the exhibits which will appear inside the convention center hall - I can tell you how the Passementerie exhibit came into being. I am a weaver, sometime spinner, formerly (and sometimes still do) knit, crochet and sew, have always been interested in textiles, fabrics and touching them and until I had children (now 9 and 6) was involved in the Interior Design Field in some fashion or another. One of those ways was by selling fabrics, including what the interior design field calls passementeries (trimmings). Once I started going to weaving conferences, I heard of these classes in kumihimo, and in braid and tassel making. I have never taken one of those classes, but have always wondered what went on there...So, being in the position I found myself in - I decided that perhaps I wasnt the only person who wondered what went on in those classes and decided we needed an informal, non juried exhibit of these types of trims. Having an Interior Design background, I went with the term Passementeries as I have always used it and as it is defined in websters dictionary...ornamental braid, fancy edging or trimming made of braid, cord, gimp, beading or metallic thread. So, my thoughts were to keep it simple and to see the trim, cording, braid work and include tassels as well. Well, I wasn't aware of all you tablet weavers, kumihimo artists, tassel makers, etc out there - and had no idea you all were available for consultation on the internet - so, now that the exhibit has been defined and published, I find that I could have refined or changed it this way or that, but then, isn't it always that way? In the meantime, this is a start, and if someone is interested in taking the concept and pushing it one way or another - I suggest you start now talking with Convergence 2002 steering committee because these things are much longer in the planning than most folks allow for. d'Harcourt was the first to really try to figure out how the elaborate fabrics from the ancient andes actually worked. But he was not really a fiber worker, and his elaborate diagrams often don't really work to make the fabric. I spent five years empirically proving that however andean slings are made, d'harcourt's diagrams are not the answer. (I did learn the answer later, tho'). His approach was to unravel the fabric to examine its structure, which works perfectly well on relatively simple fabrics but doesn't really tell you waht you need to know to make a complex textile. Still, itis a great book, never been equalled.

Bonnie is right that the fluid appraoch of andean people to fiber is truly astounding. Today, weavers make a pattern on a belt by picking up threads along a single pick of weft, and then knit the exact same pattern from the side ! That is, the first row of knitting reproduces the first warp of the belt, the second row the second warp, etc. This capacity to understand their work abstractly and not tied directly to the process of making it is so powerful that a few years ago no less an authority than Anne Rowe, Curator of Western hemisphere Textiles at the Textile Museum , was forced to write an article showing she had systematically misidentified what was warp and what was weft in her book, "Warp Pattern Weaves of the Andes".

But if the price ever comes down and the quality improves - sure, I'd give it a whirl and for several reasons. I doubt that linen can be grown on steep, logged over land in N. California but hemp will grow vigorously on our clear-cut, mistreated areas - even under some canopy I believe. Agriculture based on hemp would be a good deal kinder to the environment than grapes (there's now talk here of converting thousands of acres of stumps to grapes) and it could also be used to make paper, oil etc. For all I know, it may be possible to weave strong, lustrous, luxurious fabric for clothing from it. I hope so and I'd like to try. BTW - Does anyone know of a source of wet spun, 16/1 hemp in colors? From China perhaps?

In theory our ring spinning machine could spin many different bast fibres although in practice flax is the majority material. There is

similar proposal under consideration here in Ireland to legalize hemp. I'm reasonably certain our machine could be 'honed' to spin 'flax quality' hemp yarn. Is cost the premier criterion of the handweaver? surely not? We are playing to score commercial gain for the 'mass producers' of linen so unfortunately cost is our 'guiding light'. A couple of years ago I was given two batches of hemp roving. One was harsh and hairy and dark. The second was much lighter coloured and silky. All I could "spin" from the darker stuff was a rope-like fibre. The lighter stuff spun into a strong, silky thread. I didn't notice the sheen until I died it with cochineal. I .wove a small evening purse for my grand daughter with it and it is always mistaken for silk. A woman in our guild who is from a farm in Hungary which produced hemp told me that the fine hemp had been harvested before seed was produced and the coarse fibre was harvested after and was only used for rope. I'm certain that processing has something to do with it, but she said that they were both processed the same way.

>Is cost the premier criterion of the >handweaver? surely not?

I believe the answer to this lies in the skill/experience of the handweaver in question and the ultimate use of the project she is planning. New and inexperienced weavers will certainly go for less expensive materials. This is simply prudent. Until you have enough control over the process to be certain (or as certain as we'll ever be) of your results, you probably won't use expensive materials. And if the fabric you're weaving is for a very special purpose--a wedding gown, christening gown, wedding canopy, prayer shawl, 50th anniversary gift, etc.--you will generally spare no expense in the materials you use.

I believe there will always be a market, small perhaps, for high-end materials. We weavers support a number of suppliers of beautiful silks and silk blends (e.g., Treenway, Jaggerspun's Zephyr). In the US, particularly, it seems to be difficult to come by beautiful linen in many different grists and colors. I don't weave with linen, but we certainly read on the weave lists about people having to order linen from Scandinavia to get the variety they want. I would think that weavers could support an additional supplier of linen, particularly if the product was beautiful, did not break under the pressure of being used as warp, and was available in many colors and grists.

The amount of noise and vibration from an air compressor is one of those problems that is easily fixed with the proper application of money.

It is also helpful to build a VERY solid wooden platform, placed on top an industrial type floor mat. This worked very well for an older, rather noisy and LARGE compressor that was just installed in dental office suite - and the adjoining tenant has indicated that their is no noticeable noise or vibration.

Since air compressors are pretty standard equipment in most dental offices and on many constructions sites, it may be possible for you to contact either a serious dental supply company such as Ben co in PA, or industrial supplier such as GRAINGER (all over the country) or even a local tool rental place - heck even your garage mechanic should be able to tell you where they sell compressors locally.

Without knowing the specs called for, it is not possible to provide much info, but if you have that info and call suppliers, they will be able to tell you what will meet your needs and be the quietest, least vibrating equipment during operation.

It may also be possible to install the compressor outside in a small shed near the HVAC unit but since the basement of most town houses is cement slab, if you follow specs for distance from the walls it is unlikely you will disturb your neighbors. Offered a choice, I would install the unit in the garage of your townhouse, further insulating the possible disruption from either neighbor or personal living space.

I too have woven hemp -- many grists, some dyed, some a natural charcoal,

off-white or light brown colour. I agree completely that it is a remarkable fiber. My weavings have ended up supple, "buttery", soft but with enough weight to drape much more fluidly than similar cotton. I have to admit that my experience with linen is somewhat more limited, so I can't compare the two very authoritatively. I buy hemp whenever I see it and better prices/more variety would suit me very well.

Dan could you elaborate about the processing ? I've woven both very nice fine

line linen and fine hemp. My personal opinion is that both of these fibers are considerably improved by using a weft (or warp) of silk or rayon. I don't care for the linen "throw off" on a 100% linen warp and weft even with very nice line linen. It is a problem for your breathing and makes a giant mess under the loom. I find that linen as compared to hemp is more sensitive to humidity and if you don't live and weave in a humid area, linen is a bummer. I can beat down a linen weft and within a few minutes find it \*not\* on the fell line. It has a mind of its own. I find that hemp "softens" faster than linen and depending on the weave can make a very elastic and perhaps undesirable cloth. Another thing is the tightness of the ply , direction of ply with the direction of ply of the weft. I've woven some very nice 2/2 twill fire hose but I would not want to wear it ! With these bast yarns - the type of weave makes a big difference. Try it.

Ruth says she doesn't weave with linen, nor do I . Partly because of availability, I suspect.

Right now I'm weaving with mercerized cotton, trying to wean myself from woolens, which I realize are of less use to me living in California for a quarter of the year. AND woolen things just last forever.IE I have a house full. (I love sneaking out a piece of clothing for me from a warp.. that's probably one of the things that keeps me weaving).

However, I've had more broken warp ends than I've ever experienced with wool, and its very frustrating with a fancy advancing twill pattern; this is not going to be a perfectly woven piece of fabric. I'm not going to sweat over this one, but I guess I have to start with lease sticks tied to the rear of the loom to keep track of the broken end. UGH. I haven't the patience to mend them all in, that's for sure--

My AVL is still not advancing with every treadling. I think it's old wooden dobby head will need some attention. I'm just going slow and listening for the click of the solenoids.

Love Bonnie's idea about the loom beeping in reverse. You do get accustomed to checking the screen before resuming. And it makes for some interesting, freer designs, too.

Hi Jane:

I purchased an air compressor for the AVL recently and as you, was very wary of noise.

I bought a quite large one (tank wise) so that it would not come on as often. 25 gal I think, but it may be 40. (Can't remember) The tank is huge, 2x3 feet and big wheels and all. And Bob had trouble getting it into the basement.

I placed it in the basement (no garage available) and am glad that I did. First, it should be turned off and on every day, not left to sit idle. It needs draining frequently. So I'm glad it is close by. I don't want to go out to a garage or to the back of the house to a shed in the winter around here. Needs 220 line to plug into as well.

A hole had to be drilled in the floor near the wall for the pressure line. Loom had to be close to the wall so snakey ugly yellow hose which goes STIFF, did not run across the floor. I did not want a hole drilled in the middle of the hardwood floor either.

It needs some work to track the air leaks and fix them so having the connections accessible is a plus.

The pump takes about 5 minutes of pounding noise at startup. The noise is not too bad, except at the kitchen door leading to the basement. The cats did have to peeled off the ceiling the first time that it was used, since they were sleeping right over the pump at the time.

Now the pump comes on about once every 20 minutes for about 1 minute. I may not have all the air leaks solved though.

As for the air switch, make sure that you do not have wear work boots to use it. Most of the switches are designed for guys in work boots, standing at a machine.

Mine has a tiny switch with an air release jet pointing at the big toe. I got ball of the foot, toe cramps, ankle ache and frozen big toe in two days of use. We solved all these problems by making a pedal to work the switch. It is more or less ergonomic and kept my toe away from the air blast.

And I'm sure that Laura can tell you much more about this.

I've got air assist on my AVL treadles and therefor own a compressor. I have a 6 hp. 60 gal. compressor. I was advised by AVL to get the largest compressor I could and I'm very glad I took their advice. The larger storage tank means the compressor doesn't cycle on nearly as often as a small unit would.

My compressor doesn't use oil - which is important as I've got allergies that make that type a very poor choice for me. I keep my compressor in an adjoining [heated] porch to my studio which has an open doorway between. The wall between is insulated and you can hear the compressor quite loudly. [I wear hearing protection while weaving] It isn't that noticeable in the next room with the door closed. When I'm weaving early in the morning I close a couple of doors and my DH doesn't even hear the compressor. I do keep the studio windows closed until about 8 am just to be sure I don't bother any neighbors.

The problem with having the compressor in a garage or such is if you have cold weather you will get water in your line as the air hose goes through areas of different temperature. Water condensation in the line is serious business. I added an extra large water filter to the line just as it enters the looms filter. Another thing I do that really stops the water problem is I keep the valve on the bottom of the tank not quite tight so water drips out. I'm sure I loose a little air this way but when the humidity climbs it gets rid of a good bit of the water before it enters the hose.

An air compressor gets quite hot when it has run for awhile and must be in a well ventilated area which will also eliminate the possibility of putting it in a small enclose area. The large ones also require 220 wiring, they recommend you run a long air hose rather than run a long cord to the compressor for the electrical.

I understand there are new compressors that are completely quiet but VERY expensive. Industrial suppliers are the people who service and sell all types of compressors and could give you the max information.

Hope this is of some help.

Yes, the air compressor is noisy. However, mine is directly below our bedroom, and DH has been known to take naps while I"m weaving.

Another point to consider is good ventilation. AC's generate a fair bit of heat that needs to be dissapated. Mine just happened to wind up on the outtake side of my filter fan, and the tech that serviced it recently applauded the set up.

When the compressor is running I can talk to my helpers, or on the phone, but we need to raise our voices - not shouting, but definately raised. I always wore hearing protection anyway, so the additional noise of the compressor is not a huge factor. However, if you don't currently wear hearing protection, then I would strongly suggest you get a good set of ear phones that are industrially approved for protection against the sort of sound a compressor makes.

In Canada an industrial supply shop such as Acklands-Grainger or in the US Grainger would be able to help you with hearing protection.

You probably want to avoid the small 'pancake' compressors that are sold for contractors to run nailguns, they are cheap but they are also very noisy!!

Depending of the CFM/PSI requirements (I don't remember any more) for the Macomber, you may be able to use the small compressors they sell for Air-brush users. These you would find at an art supply dealer. They tend to run fairly quiet as artists are using them in studio where loud noise would be distracting.

Another option is to do as I have seen Macomber do for demo's, is to use the 5 gallon tanks they sell as portable tanks for filling tires, etc. You would still use a larger compressor to pressurize the small tank, then carry that to the loom. Again, the CFM/PSI requirements would dictate how long one tank

of air would last.

As to permanent installation, normally you would not run the flexible air hose inside the walls. A short piece of flexible air hose from the compressor would connect to black iron pipe (same stuff they use for natural gas lines). The pipe would be run up to the room in question where a snap air fitting would be mounted. You would then plug you flexible air line into this and connect to the loom. The pipe joints can be sealed properly and you will avoid air leaks in places you can't readily get to them. This is not usually a cheap option but is is still a DIY-type job. Your local hardware store should have the necessary parts. Else check with a plumbing/heating contractor as someone who does gas line connections would have the source for the necessary materials.

I have spent my entire weaving life measuring the length of what I'm weaving with the tension released. On the new AVL, the tension is never released. I have a question for those of you who use AVLs: do you compensate for this fact. For example, on my Macomber, if the scarf I'm weaving needs to be 68" on loom, that's exactly what I measure--with the tension off. If I measured under tension, wouldn't the scarf be somewhat shorter when the tension is released?

If you do compensate for measuring under tension, do you have a rule of thumb, for example, add x inches for every xx inches of weaving length?

I've been using an air compressor for a year and find it well worth the noise. Mine is in the garage and I ran a 100 foot air hose though two walls and across the back porch. Regarding the holes in the walls - I inserted 1" PVC pipe in the holes. Then when I'm not weaving I pull the hose out and I cap them off with PVC pipe caps. Regarding the noise, the garage is located adjacent to the kitchen and when the air compressor comes on you can hear it - but just a kinda motor noise, not really even as noisy as my garage door opener.

I was told that if you are going to run an air compressor many hours at a time, many days in a row, be sure to get a professional model, i.e. one that you have to add oil and has a belt. Air compressors that are self-oiled will wear out in short order. Also, the larger the tank, the less often the motor will come on. I have a Campbell Hausfeld with a 50 gallon tank and it has worked well. They can be purchased at stores Home Depot, Lowe's, Furrows, Sears, etc.

I never release my tension as I decided the fabric once it goes round the sandpaper beam all the way to the cloth storage roller isn't under all that much tension, Certainly not the same tension as from the warp beam to the sandpaper. Other than the final few inches rond the beam the whole shebang is quite relaxed and so I sort of squat down and measure it. (It's almost exactly 1 yard from the bottom black roller to the point at which I weave). It's only the last few inches remaining adhered to the beam (along with bits of my skin) that are under tension.

After taking the yardage from the loom, washing, etc., I determined shrinkage, take up, etc., --so I guess in effect the tension issue is part of my shrinkage calculation!

Since I rarely weave the same warp configuration more than once, my compensation factor is a guessing game. > If I measured under tension, wouldn't the scarf be somewhat >shorter when the tension is released? I would think so. >If you do compensate for measuring under tension, do you have a rule of >thumb, for example, add x inches for every xx inches of weaving length? As I said previously, how much to add is dependent upon the elasticity of the yarn as well as the tension on the warp. My suggestion is that you weave and measure xx inches under tension then release the tension and see what the piece measures. I think that this is called "sampling."

Anyone who thinks that you don't have a spiritual connection with your loom just because it has a few additional mechanical devices over and beyond an "ordinary" floor loom has never had the experience of dealing with a highly "evolved" AVL....

I must have returned from Bozeman with a swollen head or something, because my loom and the universe have obviously decided to take me down a peg, or teach me a few Life Lessons, or something.

As previously reported, I came home to a loom with re-built air assist, and the fly wheels on the beater.

The test warp: 20 yds 2/8 cotton, 49" in the reed, 16 shaft complex treadling - wove off beautifully. A few adjustments were noted as being necessary, although not critical, for the fly wheels. Wonderful! I was a happy camper. The air assist was working perfectly! :D

Blithely, I put the next warp on - a shortie - 12 yards of mixed yarns for afghans.

Immediately, problems were noted. The chain did not advance. The plain weave sheds were sometimes creatively opened as: 1,3,5,7,9,10,12,14,16. !?

Shaft number 16 cable would jump out of its finger - that was easy - add more tension to the spring underneath. Shaft number 6 sometimes would not rise - same solution. Shaft number 15 would go up when it wasn't supposed to. Add more tension. (What the heck - by this time I had LOTS of my own....)

My ailing compu-dobby was immediately suspected of enjoying its final death throes. (Peter had told me three months ago that I was using obsolete equipment and I'd better upgrade. Sure Peter - just as soon as I win the lottery!)

Tom and Glen to the rescue - but the loaner would not arrive til Monday pm.

Friday night after work, Doug took out my compu-dobby and installed the old mechanical dobby. Confident that problems were solved, I tested it out. ARRRRRRGH! SAME @\*!&@\*\$&@ thing was happening!!!!! :P~~~

Exhausted and flummoxed I fell into bed.

Sat am, I tried again thinking that I had just been totally stressed and too tired the night before. (Tight deadlines? MOI???)

Same @\*#&@!\*@#&#& thing again. Where is the axe Norman Kennedy recommends to turn wicked looms into kindling????

A timely offer of brunch out rescued the loom from being converted into btu's.

Over brunch, we also chewed over the situation. After ruling out the ailing compu-dobby as the source of the immediate problem, and deciding that obviously I was meant to at least service my own, we agreed to send mine back to AVL while we had the loaner to use. Maybe they could get mine to program the remote station cartridges a real bonus as I could then program the cartridges the fashion designer I weave for uses with her AVL.

Back to what the problem really could be. Well, the piston on the dobby arm did seem to be moving a bit slower than it should. We decided to tweak the release valves and see if that would speed it up.

Back to the studio and the loom, which was evilly chortling over our predicament.

Valves were tweaked, the timing cycle sped up, and after an hour of adjusting, watching, hoping, and sweating, we had the whole thing weaving at 54 ppm. (!) Zounds! 10 yards were accomplished.

Feeling relieved, and perhaps a bit complacent? I went back to the loom on Sunday. Again with the problems!!! After about 30 minutes of fussing, fuming, and plodding onwards, things smoothed out and I was back weaving again, perhaps even a tiny bit faster than the "officially" clocked 54 ppm. Sunday after dinner, things were not so smooth - AGAIN!

But Laura plods on - just over 8 yards for the day.

Monday morning, Laura is not so confident, and when the loom is again slow and giving bad/inconsistent sheds, she hangs her head and goes back into plod mode. After about 30 minutes, things smooth out again, and by 4 pm, just over 30 yards are in the box ready to be shipped.

Exhausted, a two hour nap is required!

After dinner, and more chewing over the problem, Doug starts looking at the loom again. Water filters are checked. Nope, they are both clean.

Tear the foot switch apart. A slight hesitation has been noted, but hadn't \*seemed\* to affect performance during the two months it has been installed on the loom. Now when it goes back together, after being dried out - still too much water in the system! - it goes together with a click! No more hesitation! Now, Tuesday pm, all seems to be working just fine. Is it fixed? Who knows. Will it happen again? Check with the Zen Master cause all I know - is that I know nothing..... Laura (aka Grasshopper) Fry who really really wishes that her problems would be obvious instead of subtle, and that the Universe would send her messages NOT written in code.... I've woven exactly one linen warp (18/2). As long as I kept it damp, there were no breakage problems. Until I learned to spritz it every time I advanced the warp, there was breakage.

JOHN OCONNOR wrote: .... If one can weave cotton > with a particular setup, then linen, being commensurately stronger, > should give minimal trouble in this respect? Ahh, but you see, this is not precisely the problem with weaving linen. Yes, linen is stronger than cotton (when wet), but it is much less elastic, much less forgiving, as a warp. So the difficulty in weaving it, in my opinion, is getting the warp on at even tension. If one can do this, then really high tension during weaving (which requires strength of the fiber to sustain without breaking) is not necessary. If one has not been able to get the warp on with even tension, the compensation is to weave with great tension on it, so that even the loose threads are at tension and the sheds open properly. IMO, this is

what causes the problem. Those who get warps on well do not have a problem weaving linen, whether the warp be singles or doubles, I believe. Of course, it takes some practice doing this, and -- going out on a limb -- if someone "grows up" on wool or similar warps, where the need for that evenly tensioned warp is not so necessary, switching to linen becomes difficult. Would appreciate an explanation for why the discussion among handloom weavers on whether to measure goods on loom with or without tension.

We measured the on-loom length of goods by the number of picks woven. This is separate from the take-up motion. Each time a pick is woven, a counter registers. If we had a specific wet-finished length target, through sampling we determined how many on-loom woven picks were needed to yield that finished length. At no time did we ever stop weaving to measure nor did we ever do a linear measurement on-loom with or without tension since this is the least accurate means of determing this value.

If using a compudobby, it will count picks for you -- so in effect it is a pick counter. If your repeat is small, you can have a long file that is the length of one project. And if you use a mechanical dobby, you know how many bars are in the chain.

That is one of the problems with a compudobby, I know how many picks are in that throw. Now if I could weave as fast as Laura..... I know practice. <gg>

And since I use the computer to design, I tend to know how many picks on a regular floor loom for the repeat. Then I can just measure the design and see if I am being consistent in the number of picks per inch and count the number of design repeats.

But when weaving something with a small repeat -- like a waffle weave blanket, you just have to measure as you go and keep track. That is what a pick counter does.

Hi Ruth:

I have always measured under tension, since tension released is not the same measure as tension released and yarn relaxed. Some fibres relax immediately, others take hours to relax.

On most looms tension is so variable that you cannot take the measurement accurately. On the kind of system that AVL has you can use the same tension throughout. And if you have a system, you can get pretty good repeat tension from project to project. Just measure the position of the arm and make sure that the arm is level when you weave.

Size differential is a matter of experience. Do it once and you will have the measure. Weave 1 yard, then weave another and when the first yard goes around the front beam to the storage beam, you can take a measure, or cut it off and measure.

Another way is to measure what you are weaving and then use the number of picks that you usually weave that piece and see if how that compares to the number of picks woven. You should be able to see that on the screen if your software gives you that reading.

I measure two ways - when I want things \*precisely\* the same, I use a pick counter. e.g. placemats. For scarves, or afghans that only have to be "sort of" the same length (ie a 1/4" here or there won't matter) then I have a ribbon that I pin to the cloth and move along the web from time to time when I change shuttles. When I get to the end of the ribbon, I'm done - or if there is a pattern repeat, when that pattern repeat is done.

As Marge pointed out, the only tension on the web on an AVL is from the sandpaper beam to the fell - the rest is not really tensioned at all. To release the tension, I kick the pawls off the pick wheel, and roll the beam "backwards" - but I rarely do this. Usually this is done if I've had a problem with the weft and need to reverse weave and reset the fell line where it belongs.

One element that can be controlled to a limited degree is the mechanical vibration of the motor-compressor against the floor. Concrete can carry sound laterally. That noise can be dampened somewhat by your mounting the motor-compressor on a platform supported on springs and incorporating a thick, vibration-damping layer of felt (e.g., 1").

Another source of noise is the snorting sound of the flapper valves. Some compressors have mufflers built into their air intakes.

> Is there something that you use as a pick counter?

I was just refering to what you know when you measure the picks per inch and the number of inches woven. If from sampling you know how many inches and/or picks you need to weave at a certain ppi, then you can either count picks or measure length. Both are the same thing.

Number of picks equals picks per inch times the number of inches.

It may be easier to count picks with weaving software and a dobby interface or with a pick counter. <gg> But measuring also works. All you need is a

nice even beat.

A chance comment reminded me that I should perhaps share our experiences with repairing wear and tear on the AVL.

Bearing in mind that I ordered my loom in 1981, that at peak production I was weaving 250+ yards (at 20 ppi average) and am currently weaving 150+ yards per month, my level of wear and tear is probably higher than most. :)

The pulleys for the treadle wore out several times. Doug finally drilled out the centre holes and installed brass bushings. As for the flanges going, the only solution was replacement. (A local woodturner helped us out with that - did it the very next day and I was weaving again in less than 24 hours.)

Other 'holes' have been similarly treated with the addition of brass bushings.

On my underslung beater (the overhead may be constructed differently) there is a wooden "plug" that holds the plastic hammer onto the steel rod. This has shattered several times, and last night Doug replaced the wood with another set of brass bushings.

After 13 and a bit months, the anchor pivot on the dobby piston

(I have air assist) has worn out of round. Doug will drill these holes out and replace them with brass bushings as well.

In order to get the speed I do, I have to have the shafts under very high tension. The metal "clips" that hold the springs/chains to the jacks(?) started to break several years ago. Doug made new ones out of coat hanger wire. These seem to be working just fine - none of the replacements have broken yet. I expect I ought to simply replace the springs and will likely do so soon. It's one of those jobs that sit on the job list until something critical happens.... :}

The shuttle race was becoming scored and we tried a number of things. Adding the air assist to the shuttles, we got a new race, so that solved that. However, my shuttles of preference are wider than the AVL shuttles, and the corners are wearing so we may add some width to the race to help keep the shuttles from "falling" off just before they enter the boxes. We had done this to the old race, and it worked just fine.

As I have no "heirs", the loom only has to last my weaving lifetime, so I compromise on higher rates of wear and tear to get the productivity I need to earn my income from the loom. I am not \*recommending\* any of this - just sharing my expiences and how we have solved our perceived problems. It is not my intent to discourage anyone from adding mechanical assistance to their looms -I couldn't do what I do without it. Rather I hope to show that if your loom isn't functioning the way you would like it to, you can make changes to it. And even if you can't "solve" your problem, you can perhaps, maneuver your way around it.....

Laura Fry who would - if she ever wins the lottery - seriously look at an industrial loom....the body can't get repaired in the same way the loom can be.....

I became fascinated with advancing twills in 1991, after seeing Verda Elliott's work and also Emily Dubois in the exhibit of weaving in the computer age, and also a sample of Verda's in a Complex Weaver's sample book that was on display in the CW booth at the MidWest conference. Then Mary Berent of Idaho told me she was using an expanded version, and Mary and Emily and I gathered around my laptop in the dorm at Intermountain Weavers the next month and excitedly watched this threading interact with all the tie-ups I had on file at the time (mostly as drawn in). My 1991-92 files using these threadings are all called "offset". I presented some of the work at the Complex Weavers Seminars in 1992, and Ingrid and I agreed to write a pair of articles. It would have been easier with e-mail! Madelyn edited our articles and she prefers the terms advancing and expanded advancing so that's what was printed.

Verda and Ingrid and I all worked with advancing twills that fall on the 4-shaft twill network; this group includes the 5-end advancing twill, expanded versions as shown in the articles in Weaver's 21, and also descending twills using 3-end runs.

In the literature at the same time we began to see the 4-end advancing twills, particularly those used in "Snowflake" twills from Sweden and Eastern Europe (there are nice examples in Jane Evans' book, A Joy Forever, and in Madelyn's drafting book) and when Doramay published her "Frost Crystals" design in Weaver's it also used a 4-end advancing twill. The 4-end advancing twill falls on a 3-shaft twill network, so it works neatly with tie-ups that are on this base, such as 2/1/1/2. Interestingly, the snowflake patterns often use 4-shaft based tie-ups to create a longer float that becomes a decorative element in these fine-thread fabrics. The expanded advancing twills cannot be used in this way, of course.

I have taught seminars on advancing twills at many conferences, including Complex Weavers 92 and 94 and Convergence 96 and 98, and they are included in 2 of my workshops. The articles cited by Ingrid in Weaver's 21 were important to me. I've also included advancing twills in my articles in Weaver's issues 27, 31, 32, and 37. Many other articles in Weaver's include advancing twills in one form or another. Often they are used as a treadling and only the liftplan form is printed.
