Preface

Welcome to *A Selective Guide to Culinary Library Collections in the United States*. This is the first part of a broader study that will eventually be worldwide, to identify institutions with significant library collections related to the culinary field.

Culinary library research can be viewed from several perspectives. Researchers directly involved in the culinary field make up only a portion of an emerging field called Food Studies. This pursuit involves culinary professionals, food scientists, dietitians, anthropologists, historians, psychologists, and sociologists, to name just a few. As a result, research about a particular aspect of the culinary field is far more than just reading cookbooks.

At the end of this report are listed a number of libraries in the United States that have significant collections in the culinary field and a few that have significant holdings in viticulture and oenology. You will notice that many of these are university or independent libraries rather than public libraries. While public libraries, in general, stock a variety of cookbooks, few have the space or budget to expand into gastronomy and other food-related areas. On the other hand, some major city and state public libraries do have significant collections, and they are included here.

This report is a sequel to the *Culinary Collection Directory* prepared in 1998 by Janice Daciuk for Barbara Haber, Curator of Books at the Schlesinger Library, Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Research, Harvard University. My thanks go to both of them for instituting this study and pursuing it. Additional thanks go to Barbara Haber for our many conversations and e-mail exchanges on this subject and also to Alison Ryley, former curator of the extensive culinary collection at the New York Public Library for her many suggestions. Linda Murray Berzok, Robin Kline, Barbara Haber, and Ralph Griswold read drafts of this document. Thanks especially to Linda Berzok for her masterful touch with the copyeditor's pen. Why This Report and Why Now?

The International Association of Culinary Professionals (IACP) Foundation instituted this report to support the emerging area of Food Studies as an academic field and to assist members of the culinary field in general. We began with the United States because some groundwork had already been done in that area and because a number of libraries in the United States have remarkable culinary holdings, not only in contemporary areas but also historical.

We have reached a time when it is not only possible but also essential that the initial stages of research employ the capabilities of the World Wide Web. In just a few years, “the Web”, as we’ll call it from now on, has gone from being a novelty to one of the standard forms of communicating information. In fact “Web-based” library catalogs are now quite standard. All but a few organizations mentioned in this report have library catalogs that are fully searchable, open to everyone, on the Web.

Initially the “computerization” of catalogs came simply from a desire to make them searchable more quickly and to save space. Converting all this to the Web, opening the faces of libraries to the world, has been a step so remarkable that its importance still has not been completely recognized. It is indeed a revolution. As a result, this introductory material discusses new approaches to library research, approaches that are radically different from the way many of us were taught, but which lead, ultimately and much more quickly, to the books and other materials we seek. Some library catalogs are available using direct Web access. A few use an older Telnet technology, which requires special software in order to access. The software is, however, easily available.

The most effective way to begin library research today begins with a computer and Web access. These tools have become essential in the current research milieu. If you do not have Web access, now is the time to consider getting it. An alternative is to gain Web access through a nearby public library or through a nearby university library. The hours of travel and the expense saved by using the Web are astounding.

This report has not listed as many statistics about a specific collection as did the *Culinary Collection Directory*. Numbers aren’t the issue; quality and depth are. Each collection is unique. Each has a different origin and emphasis. A conscious effort has been made not to “standardize” or “pigeonhole”, paying attention, instead to what is special. The information has been organized so that readers can choose the libraries most appropriate for their work.

How the Libraries Were Selected

The libraries listed were chosen based on a variety of sources. The first was the previous Culinary Collection Directory. Another was *Gastronomical and Culinary Literature* by Barbara L. Feret., The Scarecrow Press, Inc., Metuchen, New Jersey, 1989. In addition, major academic library collections and public library collections were examined. The decision to include a collection was based not only on size but also on the significance of a library's holdings. In general, collections of less than 1,000 volumes were not included unless they have some specialized value.

Using Libraries

A library is a repository of information: books, periodicals, maps, documents, microfilm and microfiche, and ephemera (documents such as posters, broadsides, menus — things that don't fit usual library classifications). A library also provides services to its constituents: advice on where to find a book or other item, instructions on working with a collection or gaining access to compact shelving, photocopying facilities and so forth.

Very rarely is there anyone in a library to assist you with your research. The research is yours to do with the tools at hand. You should not expect a library staff member to do extensive lookups for you or to do your research for you. Occasionally, libraries maintain a list of qualified persons who are available to do paid research for you.

A library serves a constituency. That constituency may be the residents of a city, county, or state in the United States, the members of a university or college community (faculty, staff, students), or members of special libraries who pay fees for access. If you are not a member of the constituency, then you are a guest or a visitor and usually special rules apply to you. In most cases you are not allowed to borrow books, although special arrangements can sometimes be made. You should expect to work on site at these libraries. In some cases you may be denied access to certain areas of the library or to the stacks.

To use a library as a guest or visitor, call, write, or e-mail ahead to find out what arrangements are necessary. The library may require a letter of recommendation from a university faculty member or a recognized scholar in your field. Once you've gone through the necessary preliminaries, the process should be smooth for you and for the staff. And remember, courtesy and kindness, "please" and "thank you", open many doors.

Contacting a Library

The ease with which Web addresses and E-mail addresses can be changed may be greater than that for telephone numbers and mailing addresses, but these numbers do change. The numbers and addresses shown were valid when this report was written. A person at the first telephone number you call should point you to the current correct number. A person at either number should be able to give you the current mailing address. If no URL or E-mail or fax address is given, the library has not provided one. If a contact address is no longer valid, try locating the library using a search engine such as Google.

What Constitutes a Good Research Library?

Libraries perform many functions. Public libraries of various sizes serve residents of those communities. Public libraries in large urban centers, however, go well beyond service to the general reader. Some, like The New York Public Library, have extraordinary holdings in the culinary field. Others simply don't have culinary material as a main acquisitions goal. They may have popular cookbooks, but books for which there is little demand by the general public often end up at the next "Friends of the Library" book sale. That does not mean that those were not excellent books; it simply means that there was not enough demand for them in that particular constituency.

Specialized libraries tailor their collections to their constituents as well. Many corporations with research divisions have their own well-stocked specialized libraries on site.

Academic libraries fall into two categories: those that serve undergraduate education and those that serve graduate education. At some institutions, the two are combined. At others the undergraduate and graduate libraries are separate or there may be separate buildings for major collections, such as science or agriculture or art. The organization flows from the goals and structure of the institution.

Many fine research libraries are integral parts of the finest universities, although some research libraries are independent institutions, like the Newberry Library in Chicago, Illinois, the Huntington Library in San Marino, California or the Morgan Library in New York City. A really good research library can make your research easier by concentrating the sources you need in one place. Many such libraries are listed in this report.

There is no “canon” of books that a culinary collection should hold. Many collections were begun by gifts from private collectors, thus reflecting the tastes and needs of the donors. It is the researcher’s job to identify which library is best suited to the task at hand. Travel to do research in libraries in preparation for writing can be supported by grant funding or publication advances. The International Association of Culinary Professionals Foundation provides some grants for this purpose.

Interlibrary Loan: What If You Can’t Leave Home?

Interlibrary Loan is a program that provides an agreeable administrative link between libraries so that books from one can be borrowed for use in another. Arrangements for Interlibrary Loan vary from institution to institution. Check with the participating library closest to you. (You can usually find out whether a library participates in Interlibrary Loan by checking its Web site.) Of course borrowing a book from a distant library takes more time than just consulting the book in the library where it resides, so you should consider this when planning your research.

Researchers who use libraries as visitors generally do not have interlibrary loan privileges. To borrow books from a variety of libraries, you should become affiliated with a library that participates in the Interlibrary Loan system and request books through that library.

Information in this report about whether a library participates in the Interlibrary Loan system was supplied by OCLC (*Online Computer Library Center*) *participating Institutions*, dated January 2001.

How To Find Who Has the Books

Searching library catalogs on the Web is one method to determine the holdings of a specific library, but another tool is WorldCat, a database available through a large number of participating libraries. WorldCat attempts to list the libraries where various titles are held throughout the world. A last glance, the “Cookery” classification in WorldCat contained over 300,000 titles. It is an enormously helpful service. WorldCat is usually not available to persons who subscribe to general Web services, but it is available via terminals in participating libraries and to university personnel who have Web services off campus through a university-based service.

Planning Ahead

When you plan to do research in any major university or city library, check with the library in advance. Since storage space in library buildings is limited, materials are sometimes stored at other sites and must be requested several days in advance.

Research

Research may simply consist of providing the necessary background for a newspaper story or head notes for a recipe in a cookbook. On the other hand, research for a book or for teaching employs a deeper examination of materials and far more time.

For background information for short-deadline work, many writers go directly to the Web. Anyone doing this should exercise selectivity, however, since some “authorities” are not accurate or have specific agendas. Critical judgement is crucial in sifting through Web information (or any other information, for that matter). Ask yourself: What is the author’s background, experience, education, reputation? Does the information concur with or contradict that of another, perhaps more-credible source? This same counsel applies to material that appears in books and periodicals.

Sources

Scholars and writers employ two kinds of sources: primary and secondary. Primary sources in a library can be manuscripts, letters, records of all kinds, documents, accounts, literature, poetry, and archaeological or anthropological evidence. For ground-breaking work that demonstrates a unique contribution to knowledge, the use of primary sources or original experimental or theoretical work is essential.

Secondary sources are books that may have been written by persons who used primary sources or used a combination of primary sources and books by other persons or who used only books written by others. Read the bibliography and reference notes in a book to determine what kinds of sources were consulted. The farther the information is removed from its original source, the more it is subject to interpretation.

Bibliographies

A first stop for research in many fields is bibliographies. For culinary research, these are found in library catalogs, logically enough, under “cookery, bibliographies” or “gastronomy, bibliographies”. Some bibliographies are just lists, rather like the bibliography at the end of a book or paper. Others are “annotated”, meaning that they either contain commentary about the work or about its production (size, binding, etc., information that is useful to collectors). Some bibliographies also contain “bibliographic essays” that give an overview of the literature discussed.

One bibliography that discusses European (and to a lesser extent United States) culinary literature, although it is somewhat out of date, is:

Getting Started

Most catalog searches, unless you are looking for a specific title or author, begin with a subject search. On the Web or on a Web-based library catalog system, choosing a subject usually is an option among several offered. Pinpointing the subject yields far better results than random guesses, however, because most libraries in the United States (and some elsewhere) use the Library of Congress subject classification list. The two most prominent subjects for the culinary field are:

gastronomy
cookery

In addition, the following subjects are sometimes helpful:

- dinners and dining
- table
- food
- menus
- viticulture
- oenology

The latter two, of course, refer to the study of grape growing and wine making.

Be sure to check individual foods and food subjects in anthropology, psychology, history, or sociology if they are related to your research topic. The “food” topic listed usually relates to scientific research about food, but it is worth examining.

An excellent university catalog that leads easily to various subtopics is that of Yale University. Explore it to get an idea of just how helpful a catalog can be in sharpening your subject sense.

From that point, your path will diverge from all others and you’re on your own to explore.

Copying

Most libraries have self-serve, coin-operated copying machines. Some provide copying assistance for a fee. Copying of copyrighted material is restricted to that which constitutes “fair use” as described in the current copyright laws. Copying may be further restricted if materials are in fragile condition. About the Library: The American Antiquarian Society is dedicated to the collection and preservation of a printed record of the United States. The third oldest historical society in the country, and the first that was national in scope rather than local or regional, it was founded in 1812 in Worcester, Massachusetts.

About the Collection: The library's holdings include approximately 3,000,000 books, pamphlets, maps, manuscripts, broadsides, prints, and newspapers relating to the culture of the first 250 years of the United States. Its collection of 18th- and 19th-century newspapers is considered by the library to be the most complete of any. The collection contains over 650 culinary items. Many of these are listed in the bibliography by Waldo Lincoln, *American Cookery Books, 1742–1860*, and published by the American Antiquarian Society in 1954. Most books are prior to 1821.

Using the Collection: The library is open to experienced researchers and is free. Access is available for researchers working on projects that require use of the collections. New readers must complete applications that describe their research projects. They must provide two forms of identification, one of which bears a photo, such as a passport or driver's license.
