The journeyman weavers of this metropolis, having suffer'd greatly of late for want of employment, and having petitioned the heads of that company to put the laws in execution, which prohibit the wear of all *E. India* silks, chints and printed callicoes, several advertisements dat'd from weavers hall were published to remind the wearer, that the penalty for having apparel or furniture of *East India* silk, or chints is 200 *l.* and forfeiture of the same; 20 *l.* for selling or having *India* printed callico, and 5 *l.* for every day wearing such gown; and on this day published the following advertisement.——

Weavers Hall, July 25, 1745.

WHEREAS several persons have within six months past bought gowns of printed callico, thro' inadvertency of the penalties incur'd by several acts of parliament for wearing them; the weavers company, *London*, give notice, that if such persons will apply to the draper that sold them, and he shall refuse to return the money the gown cost, on applying to the said company's clerk at any time within twenty days before the six months expire, he will, at the company's expence, oblige the seller to return the money for the same.
