I. RROM the few Mortuments that remain of ancient Weavers and their Art, - it's no eafy Matter to form a diftinct Idea of the way of making their Cloath and Linnen. If we may rely upon the Credit of the Figures that remain of the 4 th or sth Century, they wrought at this Trade with a great deal of Simplicity: We there find Women fpinning', others dreffing the Cloth after it was 9 made ${ }^{10}$, and the Weavers themfelves ftanding at their Work '. In the old Virgil in ro, in the Varican, thoughe to be of the 4th Century, and which formerly belong'd to our Monaftery of S. Denis in France, as I bave thewn in my Diarimen Italicum, there's a Woman feen working at the Loom ftanding ${ }^{14}$, and inftead of a Shattle $u$ - 12 frag a loag Rod. I leave it to thofe that are skilld in this Art to reafon apon this way of Weaving. Another MS in the King's Library, which is a Commentary apon the Book of Job, exhibits to us a Weaver working at the Loom alfo in a ftanding Pofture. Tho' this MS be no older than the tenth Century, yet the Figures in it are taken from MSS of greater Anriquity: For as it's raid in an ancient Commentary, the oldeft Copies of the Book of Job had thefe painted Images, which afterwards were inferted into later Manufcripts.


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
