

Buckram, (*buk'ram*,) *n.* [Fr. *bougran*; It. *buchrame*, from *buco*, a hole.] A coarse linen cloth stiffened with glue, and originally having open holes or interstices.

—*pl.* A name given to the wild garlic.

—*a.* Made of *buckram*.
